



# **Happy 15th Anniversary Rod!**

The countdown is on for The Cosmo's 15th Birthday Bash.

Four days of live music, free gigs across the Easter weekend (18-21 April), and a special ticketed show from Australian music legend Steve Kilbey (The Church) on Sunday night.

2009 marked a new beginning for The Cosmo with Rod Hughes and Peter Griffin purchasing the burnt out shell. Driven by a vision of the pub's glory days - of exceptional food, wine and the company of great friends - their plans to rebuild and restore The Cosmo became the talk of the town.

The project was to be one of a labour of love and patience given the enormity of damage to the building. In June 2005 the 1866 building succumbed to fire – fire crews were called at about 1.30am after a hotel guest alerted the owners that the building was ablaze. Guests had only minutes to evacuate before flames took the entire building, spreading from the laundry to the roof void, then the pub's original roof shingles. In 2007 a proposed subdivision of the hotel site was opposed by some Trentham residents, following which the Hotel was put on the market. Enter Rod, taking on the renovation of his life!

The Cosmopolitan Gardens were opened in 2009, and the following year the old Stables were transformed into a bar and restaurant, while the painstaking work began on the damaged Hotel itself. Efforts were made to retain and use original materials wherever possible, not easy for a firedamaged timber hotel constructed in the late nineteenth century to typical pioneering settlement standards (built in stages). The bar was opened up to suit twenty-first century usability, but the original charm remains with the original windows providing a thoughtful nod to yesteryear. To the delight of the town, December 2012 marked the grand opening of the newly rebuilt Cosmopolitan hotel - back to it's former glory!

The Cosmo has continued to evolve since it reopened. It's also a bespoke wedding venue (I can confirm, Fi is the most fabulous event manager / wedding co-ordinator!) A woodfire pizza oven has been installed (the perfect accompaniment to the region's best beer garden), the Cellar and Store which grew into the cosy Cosmo wine room, and most recently the Cosmopolitan Cottage has opened, offering luxury accommodation next door to the hotel.

But accompanying this change are the constants. The picture-perfect elms of the beer garden. Wednesday night Curry Night. Numerous cosy fires warming our 7 month Trentham Winter. Walls displaying art by local Artists. Walking into the



bar and Brendan knowing what you want before you even ask. The Friday night meat tray raffle, supporting our many community groups (I suspect the bragging rights of the winners are more highly sought after than the prizes). An unwavering dedication to and celebration of our region's best food and wine. And original live music in fabulously atmospheric and acoustic corners of this magnificent hotel.

Thanks Rod for taking a chance on The Cosmo: we salute you. Happy Anniversary!

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# Councillor's Report

On Wednesday 19 March I was invited by Trentham Community Action Inc. (TCA) to address the community on a range of Council matters.

In presenting, my objectives were to provide the community with up-to-date information, respond to questions and concerns and generally raise awareness that several significant opportunities will arise in the coming months for input from the community into strategically important plans.

Pleasingly there were 90 community members present.

In the lead up to 30 June Council will develop its next 4-year Council Plan, set a budget for 2025/26, update its financial projections for the next 10 years and advance the town structure plans and rural strategy. Each of those pieces of work are critically important for Council's direction and present as key opportunities for community engagement and input.

The **Trentham town structure plan**, conditionally adopted in September 2024, requires more technical work in some areas and there will be opportunity for further community consultation. The process undertaken through 2024 saw strong input from the community and we need that involvement to continue. By May 2025 the arrangements for implementation of the plan will be clearer. Timing of implementation is important – any undue delays will leave our town subject to the ongoing risk of inappropriate development occurring.

The **4-year Council Plan** sets the strategic direction and priorities for this new term. By its very nature it strongly influences the budget. The previous Plan covered 5 focus areas, 23 priority statements and 116 strategies. While there were many successes and achievements through that term there is a growing consensus that financial pressures demand that this next Plan concentrates more on basic services and core business. In the absence of any legislated guidelines reaching consensus on what constitutes core business for Council remains the topic of much debate within the councillor group. I encourage community members to closely review the draft Plan when it is released and provide input.

In 2024 Council consulted widely on its **financial outlook**. The projected \$4m pa cash shortfall was transparently disclosed and, faced with needing to cut costs and therefore services, community input was sought on which services should be subject to change. The challenging outlook is caused by sharply escalating costs and the cumulative effect of below-CPI rate capping adjustments applied over many years. Hepburn Shire's relatively small size – only 8000 residential ratepayers – and its multiple service centres – Clunes, Creswick, Daylesford, Hepburn Springs, Trentham, Glenlyon – hamper efficiency and duplicate costs.

To address the projected cash shortfall Council has considered selling surplus assets however there are very few, if any, land and buildings that can be sold. Similarly, Council is constrained in taking out further borrowings for capital projects as there is no surplus cash to service that increased debt. Regional councils also have very few, if any, opportunities to secure new income streams, unlike our

counterparts in metropolitan areas.

The immediate approach is therefore to identify cost savings of \$2.64m pa, across all areas of Council's operations, and seek a 10% increase to rates which would raise an additional \$1.36m pa. It is expected the ESC will make a decision on rates by late April.

The combined effect of cost savings and rate increase is necessary to address the cash shortfall and take steps towards ensuring Council's ongoing viability.

**The future.** The meeting considered what Council would look like should the 10% rate increase be granted and cost savings of \$2.64m be applied, through reduced services. Having already cut costs by \$1.5m in 2024/25 the total impact on services would be a 12.5% reduction.

But ratepayers would be paying 10% more for 12.5% less services.

Not a palatable or satisfactory outcome from a ratepayer perspective.

Even in that scenario Council as an organisation would not have surplus cash to buffer against unforeseen emergencies (such as storms, floods, fire); would not have surplus cash to make co-contributions should grants be secured from other tiers of government; and would have no cash to fund the construction of new assets. The capital works program has already been limited to the renewal of existing assets only.

The meeting called for Council to continue its advocacy with the State government for the consideration of other changes – such as boundary changes - that would lead to ensuring vital services are maintained in a sustainable manner and at a reasonable cost to the ratepayer. TCA has subsequently conveyed that message to the councillor group and CEO.

I encourage you to watch out for the draft budget when it is released, provide input, and be aware of further updates on these matters.

# How rates work

I provided the following data to the community meeting.

As part of the budgeting process Council determines the rate payable. For 2024/25 the rate payable for all residential properties across the Shire is 0.002217. An independent valuer determines each property value every January. The property value used for rating purposes is the capital improved value (CIV) of land and buildings. The amount we pay as rates is the CIV multiplied by 0.002217.

The table on the following page shows the number of residential properties by location (major towns only), their assessed value, the average CIV and rates payable. The table includes only rates and does not include other items such as waste charges.

# **Energy Resilience Project**

# **Battery**

Great news for Trentham with the Victorian Government recently announcing a \$400,000 grant to install a Neighbourhood Battery and more solar panels at the Mechanics Trentham. As the designated community emergency relief centre for Trentham and district, this upgrade will provide power during bushfires and storm events whenever the grid fails; potentially for 200 people up-to 7 days. A joint application with the Central Victorian Greenhouse Alliance and Hepburn Shire Council, based on TSG's previous work, achieved this result. The battery will be operational by October 2026.

# Microgrid

The battery at the Mechanics is just the first step in making an Energy Resilient Trentham. TSG has now engaged consultants to deliver a Technical Analysis for an "islandable microgrid" for the centre of Trentham based on the Market Street transformer, which currently services 33 commercial properties and 102 residential properties. What does this actually mean? Like the system to be installed at the Mechanics it will include a battery, increased solar, a generator and will provide power to those properties when the grid fails. By keeping the centre of Trentham operating in such events it will enable all residents of Trentham, and the surrounding districts, to access the existing services in Trentham.

Our consultants will be reporting to the community on all aspects of their proposal such as; preferred locations for equipment, operational models, environmental issues and how residents can be involved.

The first of a series of Community Engagement Forums will be held: 7.00 pm, Tuesday 29 April at the Mechanics.

So, come along, ask questions, have your say and help us keep the lights on!

# The Melbourne International Flower & Garden Show

Within the industry, garden shows can be a bit 'love 'em or hate 'em'. On the positive side, there is so much creativity in these shows and so many opportunities to connect with people in the industry. On the downside, there's certainly a lot of 'smoke and mirrors' to the displays, and there's definitely A LOT of opinions flying around!

It's a big step to enter yourself into a garden show like the Melbourne International Flower and Garden Show (MIFGS) and I was excited when my application for a 'Boutique Garden' (5m x 5m) for MIFGS 2025 was accepted in October last year.

Finalists are provided with a grant to cover some of the construction costs, but usually designers will fork out extra cash themselves to showcase their absolute best work. Some companies are known as great sponsors of the gardens, and this is part of the reason you will often see certain plants and materials repeating through in different gardens.

The gardens are constructed to last for exactly 5 days before they are pulled apart; plants are still in their plastic pots artfully disguised with mulch, and there's a lot of particleboard holding everything together that would normally require more substantial engineering.

My theme was 'The Breakup Garden' and I wanted in to showcase the beauty of imbalance, change and unexpected transformation. I used materials in unexpected, seemingly 'unfinished' ways to create this feeling, as well as a free flowing planting scheme mixing many plants originating in both Asia and Australia.



Unfortunately, prizes were not forthcoming but I was super happy with my display. Thank you to all my Trentham clients for supporting me through the years!

# **Barry Herbert Elliott 1940-2025**

Barry was always a fit, lean athletic person who was not daunted by a challenge. The challenge to be a principal to encourage staff and students to be their best or the challenge of getting a wild bull to market when the yards were paddocks away. The main strands of his interests were farming, teaching, family and community.

Over time he taught at six country High schools was general manager of the North-Eastern Region for Education and then became CEO of the Central Health Interpreters Service in Melbourne. He then retired to farming in the Trentham District.

At Spring Hill in 1968 he cleared paddocks, took the timber to be preserved for fence posts, erected fences and dug all the postholes himself. He built sheds and several stock yards, electric fences and delivered water in troughs to every paddock, fenced off the waterways and planted environmental corridors. He farmed at Spring Hill, Nutfield, Trentham North and East Trentham. Sometimes all those places at once. Barry enjoyed cattle sales, auctions and collecting old machinery. The rich volcanic soil with abundant moisture in Trentham grew grass, vegetables and fruit very well. Some will remember those bunches of rhubarb and carrots for the sustainability stall in Trentham.

Barry was keen to involve farmers in Landcare. Speakers showed them all how to improving pastures and soil, create new products for markets, identify weeds in the district. Along with all the other Landcare members, he spent many hours spraying gorse and planting trees grown from local seed. Many merry landcare nights were held at the Pig and Whistle Hotel. He was president of the local landcare committee for 15 years.



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# Rachel's Farm -A Free Movie Screening in Trentham

Wednesday 2 April, 7.30pm The Mechanics Trentham

Acclaimed actor and director Rachel Ward is an unlikely figure on the frontline of a farming revolution. But that is what she has become.

After she and her husband, fellow actor Bryan Brown, settled on a farm in NSW to raise cattle and their children, they grew accustomed to the odd flood and drought. Finally, though, they were threatened by something worse: the catastrophic bushfires of 2019-2020.

This forced Ward to confront her role, however small, in the precariousness of our environment. What impacts were her farming techniques having? How was her ecological ignorance adding to the toll of rising temperatures, topsoil loss and declining biodiversity? One result was a complete change in the way she farmed, a switch to regenerative farming; another was to turn her creative skills to producing a film outlining her embrace of this fresh approach to agriculture.

The result is "Rachel's Farm", an insightful, moving and entertaining feature that is about to have a special screening in Trentham.



Sponsored by the Trentham Sustainability Group, "Rachel's Farm" will be shown at The Mechanics Trentham, Wednesday, 2 April, at 7.30pm.

Blackwood and Barry's Reef Landcare is holding a working bee targeting holly, 5 April at St Martins Community Chapel. There will also be a demonstration on how to map holly using iNaturalist.

Another target area will be in the forest along Lynches Track, south of Bullarto. These trees will be tackled by cutting and painting. Proposed date Sat 12 April 10 AM.

The third one will be close to Trentham – later in April

Holly is particularly invasive because of the conditions in this part of the district, cool and (usually) good rainfall. Gardens of the towns in and adjacent to the forest are weed sources with some farmlands bordering the forest also of concern. The roads, tracks, electricity lines and even the old railways provide corridors for weed movement into the forest.

In your home garden, keep a look out to remove emerging holly plants and if you have large shrubs, please consider removing them as they also form a significant fire risk. Read more about weeds in the forest in the December edition of Wombat Forestcare Newsletter (online).




# **Quarry Street Reserve**

Work will soon commence on the QSR part of the A Healthy Coliban Catchment Bright-eyed Brown Butterfly Restoration Project. The aerial photo shows the first stage where weed removal will occur on 25 metres of Stony Creek, both sides. This will be an ongoing process, monitoring the effectiveness of the treatment. Jute matting will then be laid prior to revegetation in October this year.

By focusing on the Butterfly habitat, the creek environment has a greater chance of returning to be a heathy part of the Coliban catchment.

Treatment will focus on a serious emerging weed, Sharp-flowered Rush, which currently dominates the creek line. We'll be interested to see how this is tackled.

The Healthy Coliban Catchment Project has funded the Hepburn Shire Council to conduct on-ground habitat works in partnership with three community groups in Trentham. # THE STORY OF TED SHELDEN: 1,962 days of military service



As we approach the 110<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the ANZAC landings at Gallipoli we remember those who served and who died not only in World War I but all wars and Peacekeeping missions. In particular, we remember those who enlisted from Trentham and the surrounding districts.

For the people of Trentham, their earliest involvement in war was with the enlistment of some eight men in the Boer War, when Rupert (Rube) Thornton became Trentham's earliest death in war. Today Australian military personnel continue to serve on Peacekeeping operations in the Middle East.

In contemporary times we have recognised Sandy Matheson for his bravery during WWII in PNG where he was awarded the Military Medal. The Kyneton RSL continues to recognise Sandy with an annual award for leadership to a student at Trentham Primary School.

Less recognized perhaps was Edward Francis Shelden. Ted, as he was known, was born in 1916 and enlisted in the 2nd AIF on 23 May 1940. He lived in Lyonville where he worked as a farm labourer for his father Edward Hansford Shelden, who was listed as his next of kin. Within a month Ted was to suffer the first of several bouts of serious illness when he was hospitalized at Puckapunyal with Rubella (German Measles). But no malingerer: on 19 October 1940 Ted was aboard the HMT Aquitania en route to the Middle East where he served until 29 March 1942.

In August of that year Ted embarked from Townsville on the MV Gorgon to the conflict north of Australia where he spent the next five months. On 16 December Ted, now an A/SGT platoon commander, was located near Gona on the PNG east coast when his platoon came under sustained enemy fire. He crawled across a creek to position himself just metres from an enemy post, killing two occupants with a grenade. He then went onto another two pits killing another four enemy soldiers. Later that night he led his men forward occupying the enemy pits, thus obtaining excellent observation over the remaining enemy positions. For his courageous actions he was awarded the Military Medal.

On his return to Australia in January 1943 Ted had good and bad news. In March he was granted 12 days leave but later in the month was severely reprimanded, and forfeited 13 days pay, presumably for overstaying his leave by about three weeks! It seems the reason was that he had married Daisy Irene Shelden from Little Hampton. Ted then served at a training unit in South Australia and was commissioned as a Lieutenant in July 1943. In July 1944 he returned to the jungles for 16 arduous months in and around Green Island, Lae, Bougainville and New Britain. In 1946 Ted was Mentioned in Despatches for distinguished service in the South West Pacific, between 1 October 1944 and 31 March 1945.

Ted was discharged on 9 October1945 when he returned to Lyonville. His family moved to a property in Camp Street in 1947, and at some later date Ted and Daisy settled in Nambour Queensland where he died on 31 August 2000.

In the excellent publication 'Trentham at War' compiled by Ina Bertrand and Jan Robertson on behalf of the Trentham & District Historical Society, Edward Francis Shelden is acknowledged, and his name appears on the Enlistment Board in the new Trentham Library. Unfortunately his family name is misspelt as Sheldon, as often occurred on his printed military documents. But we know who he was, what he did and salute him for his many acts of bravery.

Aside from the recent Mechanics, sportsground and Quarry St developments, Trentham got the bare minimum for the first 25 years even though we paid our (higher) rates and agitated for a fair go.

## And now?

We face a 10% hike in rates and heavy cuts in Council services (yet to be determined). Trentham's higher property valuations mean that we will continue to pay a disproportionate share of the total rate bill - for the benefit of other far-flung parts of the Shire.

Wards have been abolished and several hundred absentee ratepayers have been dropped from the (former Coliban Ward) electoral roll making it an incredibly difficult task for any future local candidate to attract the quota required to be elected.

A 10% rate increase and \$2.4M in service cuts will only achieve a 'holding pattern' – there will be no scope for new major initiatives or reserves to respond to disasters.

### It's a White-Out

White is a popular colour which gains its brilliance when accompanied with an abundance of natural light. Every paint chart will have hundreds of whites to choose from, often making it difficult to find the right white.

No matter which style of interior resonates with you, in an all-white interior you need to play with your full decorating toolbox. It's all about contrasts of texture to play shadows, and how different materials either absorb or reflect light.

Take advantage of different materials: an undressed piece of driftwood will provide visual stimulation with its gnarly knots and grain; a slab of polished granite or marble will be smooth and reflect light differently.

Layering different materials and shapes is important. Rooms tend to be square and can be boxy, so using rounded occasional furniture and curved details will soften the look.

White interiors allow you to unify a broad mix of furnishings: soft furnishings step up when you blend cottons with wools, natural and organic fabrics with distinctive texture. I enjoy using and placing a blend of furnishings together, some older and more elaborate, juxtaposed against cleaner and simpler more contemporary pieces. Oversized fluffy white towels are a romantic favourite in the bathrooms, but think white bedlinen with delicate embroidery, lace work and interesting stitching, either neatly tailored or jumbled together. Use glass objects and ceramics, corralled together into a tray for lustre.





Architectural features can be emphasised in an all-white interior: you could adopt the colour drench route, covering walls, ceilings and millwork (mouldings, architraves, doors, windowframes) using a single colour; or search for and use raw and recycled timbers, as beams, fire surrounds, doors and windows.

For a more modern Scandinavian aesthetic, consider a lick of matt black paint on the architrave framing a window, acting like a makeup eye liner, clearly defining the change of materials from wall to glass.

Nothing quite says a country home welcome more than a blazing open fire: think about the stone or brickwork surrounds left exposed and painted white for texture, with a glossy white mantel, or no mantel at all. A sculptural light fitting will look spectacular in a mix of glass and pewter, with decorative task and ambient lamps around your room. An all-white interior is all about creating a comfortable home for you, in which your collections shine - whether your style is traditional or more modern - utilising the rules of contrasting size and shape, collating furnishing and building materials of varied texture and patina.


Tim also dipped into his You Am I days with memorable hits such as Heavy

# Member of the Month: Judy Weatherhead



# Erasmus of Rotterdam - Citizen of the world at the birth of a new nation.

What is usually referred to as the 'invention of the printing press' has coincided with a new development in human consciousness: a shift from collective to individual - from stratified to functional - which spread around the world departing from cities at the river Ysel in Nederland collectively known as 'Hansa'. One of the Hansa cities is Deventer. Birthplace of Geert Groote, scholar from Paris, deacon and preacher, eloquently fulminating against church misconduct as part of an (ongoing) Catholic reformation movement, late 14th century, 120 years before Martin Luther.

Geert Groote's initiative started a lay movement, not bound by 'vows' like religious orders, but by 'promises' (like later the Quackers). Under the name "Devotio Moderna" the movement spread throughout Europe: Copernicus in Poland, Ignatius in Spain, Thomas of Kempen, Germany, author of "De Imitatione Christi", which - after the bible - became the world's most printed book for centuries. Thomas a Kempis belonged to the 'Brothers of the Communal Life' with its centre in Deventer where Erasmus was educated. Erasmus suffered from gout and remembered how cold life with the brothers had been. But they had a way of living and working with books, that made Erasmus a pioneer in using the printed word for public discourse, education, debate and critique. With his sharp pen he directed the course of public thinking. He was expected to defend church doctrine against Luther's interpretation but defended freedom instead. He travelled Europe from monastery to monastery to collect Greek and Latin texts from their libraries and doing so helped lay the foundation for classical education in European high schools: Homer, Plato, Livius, Virgil, Ovidius, Tacitus and so on.

Twice he travelled to England, complaining about rough treatment by customs. Thomas More, Lord Chancelor to King Henry XVIII was his friend. Both criticized the ruling powers and manners of the time.

Erasmus wrote an elaborate treatise "In Praise of Stupidity", which allowed him to take the micky out of prelates and princes, cardinals and kings without falling out of grace. More wrote his 'Utopia', [from 'eu = good]: an ideal society imagined somewhere in the newly discovered Pacific Ocean, where children are given precious stones, gold and diamonds to play with, so as adults they would treat these as 'kids' stuff' not worth pursuing. More's 'Utopia' started a literary genre and inspired social renewal, including the 8-hour workweek.

Erasmus inspired a whole nation to become a republic

where no monarch would impose his religious faith, which made - from the 16th century onward - Nederland a safe haven for all who were persecuted for their convictions. Five hundred years later, his name still resonates in the Europe of our time: baptised as 'Geert Geertzoon', "Geert" from 'begeren" = "to desire, to love" he translated his name into latin: Desiderius and Greek: Erasmus (from Eros, Love). At the end he declined the Pope's offer to make him a Cardinal. "One doesn't make a Cardinal out of a dying man". (a hint for future popes?). He died in Basel on a visit to his printers. His last word: "Lieve God" (dear God).
