The Minister for Planning has approved the C80Hep Hepburn Planning Scheme amendment, which builds on the significant work of Council and the community in recent years. The amendment protects our towns from inappropriate planning and development. The changes bring the scheme up to current planning standards and sets out strategic work that will be undertaken over the next few years. There will be opportunities for the community to get involved in structure planning for each township. We will share more information on this in coming months. TRENTHAM PAVILION

Works are progressing well at Trentham Sportsground Reserve, with the new pavilion on track to be completed later this year. Demolition of the old pavilion is in progress, with change room walls, the old kitchen and bar area now removed. Power, water and sewerage are being installed, and the team will be ready to pour the concrete slab in

Once completed, the new pavilion will be a fantastic community facility, with new kitchen, canteen and bar facilities, female-friendly player and umpire change rooms, a multipurpose function room, outdoor spectator areas and public facilities.

Council has provided \$413,000 to this project, and is grateful for the generous \$2.062 million grant from Sport and Recreation Victoria through the Community Sport Infrastructure Stimulus Program.

Outraged by Outages?

Does Trentham have too many power outages?

Is anyone doing anything about it?

Well yes, there's some local action - but we need lots more!

TRENTHAM SUSTAINABILITY GROUP

The real question is what are Powercor and government doing about it?

Locally, people are seeking greater self-reliance by installing solar and battery capacity - but these can't deal with major outages such as the crisis caused by the storm Trentham suffered last June.

We are developing a strategy for greater reliability in the power supply, particularly for essential services, and encouraging action to reduce our total emissions. [The strategy is being developed by Trentham Sustainability Group (TSG) together with Trentham & Districts Community Bank (Cool Country Community Enterprises – CCCE Ltd) and is funded by CCCE and a grant from Hepburn Shire Council.]

Further on there are opportunities for Trentham to seek funding support from the government for community batteries and microgrids. Both require demonstrated strong community support and 'small p' political pressure.

We think the message the decision-makers in Powercor and government need to hear is:

- Our power supply is unreliable Trentham has too many outages!
- Many of us don't feel safe in a crisis such as the 3-day storm blackout in June 2021.
- What are your plans to address this?

We need people power to show the powers-that-be this is an important issue to Trentham!

TSG has funding from Coliban Water to engage the community to work for greater power reliability and we are calling for people to get involved.

You don't have to know anything about the technology of power supply, grids etc - we need people with a wide range of skills. For starters, we hope to organise a film night and visits from people in other small towns tackling similar challenges.

We are planning a targeted campaign over the next 8 months. We need people to join us and help make a noise to make a real difference for our community.

You may have seen the Hepburn Planning Scheme Amendment was approved by the Minister for Planning in February: participate.hepburn.vic.gov.au/planning-scheme

Trentham is soon to be the focus of Council's attention as it prepares our Town Structure Plan. The Town Structure Plan provides a medium to long term framework for: future subdivision, land use, zoning, open space, infrastructure and protecting and enhancing the unique qualities our community values. Right now, Council is working on Creswick's Town Structure Plan: Trentham will be next.


This will be our opportunity, as residents and community groups, to lobby for planning regulations that reflect our values and the character of Trentham. It's a chance for everyone to think about what matters to them, and what they'd like to see in the future. Are you satisfied with the way the town is shaping up? Concerned about the loss of native vegetation? Want more bicycle and walking path access?

Here at The Trentham Trumpet, we want to help by providing residents and local groups with a way of sharing their views. We're not here to influence your opinion, we just want to collate our collective thoughts, wants, and needs. That way, we can help Council to understand what matters to us and they in turn can give us the Town Structure Plan we need. Other towns are speaking up!

Each week Council receives around 200 planning applications across the shire. Coliban is the fastest growing ward. That means Trentham is changing – and fast. If we don't have our say, we'll get the townscape we're given.

So, from mid-March, we'll put a survey on our website, asking for your views about Trentham. Our April edition will contain a hard copy of the survey and we'll aim to have some available around town.

Please help us to find out what do Trentham residents want? Your answers will be kept confidential, or you can



We invite individuals, groups and organisations to spend a few minutes giving your views.

Who are we? We are residents who care for our town. Chris Campbell, Cr Brian Hood, Penny James, Ian MacBean and Vicki Steggall. Why are we doing this? Because we believe council needs to know what matters to us: if we don't tell them, they can't know. Our role is simply to ask questions and collate answers – so when Council starts looking at our Town Structure Plan and doing their own consultation, they'll better understand our town, its unique character, and produce the best Town Structure Plan for us.

Business Victoria's Small Business Bus is visiting Trentham on Monday 28 March! CVGA's Business Energy Officers will be on hand to talk with small businesses about how to save money on your energy bills.

Special offer! Bring your electricity or gas bill and we'll show you how to look for a better deal.

If you're the owner of a small business, concerned about high power bills or your business' climate impact, looking for information about better energy plans, about rebates for refrigeration and hot water, or about going solar, CVGA's Business Energy Officers can help.


Since launching in 2021, the Small Business Energy Saver Program has assisted over 2600 Victorian small businesses to access the Victorian Energy Upgrades scheme. Eligible businesses have received rebates averaging \$2050 for upgrades including purchasing refrigeration, and upgrading water heating to heat pump.

In central, western and north west Victoria, equipment upgrades have netted small businesses an average of \$2270 in rebates, reducing emissions by almost 55,000 kg ${\rm CO_2}$ -equivalent (that's equivalent to the emissions from burning nearly 400 tonne of coal!)

Art News

National award for local printmaker Dianne Longley

Congratulations to Dianne Longley, Agave Print Studio, for winning the 2021 'Australian **Bookplate Design** Award'. Australian artists and graphic designers are invited to produce hand-printed Ex Libris bookplates. For those new to this art form, a bookplate, also known as an Ex-Libris, is a printed label pasted into a book, often on the inside front cover, to indicate ownership. This prestigious award, conducted by the Keith Wingrove Memorial Trust, is held every two years and it's the richest bookplate design award in the world.



The award winning print 'Ex Libris Dan Jones' (15 x 10.5cm) is of Trentham man Dan Jones, who has many metal-working skills and one of them is restoring Albion printing presses. He restored Dianne's 1860s Albion Press when it came to Agave Print Studio in 2018. Dan gradually repaired the press in his metal machining workshop with assistance from his brother Tim Jones who did the finishing touches of gold lettering work. The winning Ex-Libris print was printed on Dianne's Albion press from a relief or letterpress photopolymer plate.

Dianne is a master printmaker and makes her artwork and runs printmaking workshops in her iconic A-frame studio, set in a sublime garden. Agave Print Studio offers printmaking workshops, as well as studio access and residencies, printmaking collaborations and edition printing. Print and book workshops can be for those with experience or tailored for beginners wanting a relaxing day of exploring art and sharing a fabulous local produce lunch. Dianne is holding an Agave Open Studio event on April 2-3, 2022 on Saturday and Sunday from 12-5pm. The award



winning print will be displayed and there will be a Popup Gallery, art sales, demonstrations, garden strolls, studio tours and a scrumptious afternoon tea.

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Councillor's Report

Council's provision of aged care services – a decision will be taken at the 15 March meeting on Council's ongoing role for the provision of aged care services. Changes to funding arrangements by the Federal Government are forcing councils Victoria-wide to consider their role in this critically important area. Details can be found at Aged and disability services | Participate Hepburn. I encourage feedback to Council via their website or directly to me.

Planning – the Minister for Planning has approved a new planning scheme for Hepburn Shire. While Hepburn's regulations had not been significantly updated for 20 years and the new plan is an important step forward, there remains much more work to be done in the coming years. On that note I congratulate the Trumpet editors for supporting the initiative of concerned residents to gather input from community members on all matters planning. (see page 5) This feedback will form an important part of the consultation process and will help shape future directions in planning regulations. More detail on the revised scheme can be found at

Planning backlog – some of you will be painfully aware that the processing of planning applications is currently experiencing significant (and unacceptable) delays. Staff shortages, resignations and the inflow of 200+ applications per week is creating a backlog. Recruitment is underway to employ more staff.

Major projects – the project to upgrade the Quarry St Reserve pavilion is being retendered.

Storm recovery – negotiations with the State Government to secure more funding for storm recovery works are ongoing. Some works have been undertaken to clear walking trails but much more is to be done. By way of comparison the January flooding event in Creswick has caused as much damage as the June 2021 storm.... although many more people have been forced from their homes plus local farmers have lost crops valued at \$30m. Understandably these two weather crises have placed considerable strain on Council's human and financial resources.

Child care – a low-key event was held recently to celebrate the opening of Trentham's child care facility. Both the child care facility and kindergarten are operating fantastically well, but a statewide shortage of staff is preventing an expansion of day care hours to meet the community's needs. Efforts to employ more staff remain ongoing.

Lyonville Woodchop – congratulations to the hardworking Lyonville Hall Committee for staging a highly successful 49th edition of the woodchop. A great family day was attended by many and the competition was fierce. Local sponsors enabled the event to raise funds for the ongoing maintenance of the popular community hall.

Speed limits – concerned residents have raised the matter of road speed limits with me. As our community grows and visitors return, this safety issue is rightly causing concern. I have provided Council with a list of problem areas. Council management continues to liaise with the decision-making

authority, RRV (formerly Vicroads), to make changes. (Editor's note: see page 18 for details of a current petition instigated by concerned Cosmo Road residents)



Aquatic strategy – at our February meeting Council decided to release the draft aquatic strategy for public consultation. The report sets out the need for an investment of \$6m-\$8m to repair pools across the shire and discusses the community's desire for a heated indoor aquatic centre. At this stage neither initiative is budgeted. See Hepburn Shire Aquatics Strategy – Have Your Say | Participate Hepburn and I encourage you to provide your input.

Council meetings – monthly meetings will be held at the new starting time of 5.30pm on the third Tuesday of the month. The public's in-person attendance will be determined according to prevailing Covid restrictions. Upcoming Council meeting dates are – 15 March, 20 April, 17 May.

- Hepburn receives rates income of \$18.39m per year.
- Like all Victorian councils, Hepburn cannot increase rates beyond the 1.5% cap applied by the State government.
- Coliban ward (which includes Trentham) contributes rate income of \$3.4m each year or 18.5% of the total.
- Rates from Coliban ward are levied across 1629
 rateable properties at an *average* of \$2091 per property
 this is the highest average in the shire.
- Rates are based on property value.

Trentham Weather 2021

January 2021

A slightly warmer than average month but not excessively hot. The warmest day reached 33.6°C on the 24th. Night temperatures were slightly below the normal and the coldest night fell to 3.6°C on the 13th. The month was considerably wetter than usual with 142.2mm with the wettest day recording 71mm on the 29th.

February 2021

Daytime temperatures continued the trend of being slightly above normal, but despite this no extreme maximum was recorded for the month. The warmest day was just 29.7°C on the 11th. Again, night minima were slightly below normal with the coldest night 3.1°C on the 28th. Rainfall however saw a marked departure from normal with only 29.4mm recorded, just 60% of average. The wettest day was 11mm on the 15th.

March 2021

Daily maximums were near normal and again no extreme heat was recorded with the warmest day just 25.7°C on the 12th. Overnight minimums were slightly below average and the coldest night of 0.7°C was on the 15th. This date also recorded the first ground frost, earlier than usual. Rainfall exceeded the average recording 84.3mm and the wettest day of 38.4mm was on the 21st.

April 2021

April was a benign month, slightly cooler than usual and the warmest day of 26.8°C was on the 2nd. The overnight average minimum returned cooler than normal, and the coldest night was -1.2°C. Light air frosts were recorded on 4 nights. Rainfall was scarce in April with only 22.5mm, well below average and the wettest day returned just 5.4mm

May 2021

Average day maximums were near normal, and the warmest day was 20.4°C on the 6th, however overnight minimums were colder than usual. Several killing frosts developed in the last week culminating in a record cold May temperature (since 1983) of -6.1°C on the 31st preceded by a -6.0°C on the 30th. This early severe cold caused garden chaos with many damaged or killed plants. May was also a wet month with 133mm, almost 30% above normal. The wettest day was the 4th with 44.2mm

June 2021

Following the disastrous frosts of May, if we were hoping for a better month weatherwise it wasn't to be June. June 2021 was a month of extremes. Near record amounts of rain and the terrible storm of the 9th and 10th June. Average maximum temperatures were slightly below average, and the mildest day reached 13.6°C on the 2nd. Overnight temperatures were near average, and the coldest night was -5.1°C on the 5th. Rainfall was well above the norm with 250.2mm with the wettest day 62.2mm on the 9th.

What has become known as "the great storm" developed on the evening of the 9th June and continued into the early hours of the 10th June. A ferocious southeast gale continued for almost 8 hours cutting power and devastating parts of the Wombat Forest. A storm this severe had not been recorded in modern times. The deep low pressure system moved across the central ranges

from the southeast. Huge tracts of forest were decimated. Winds between 120 and 180kmh destroyed thousands and thousands of trees. Trentham was cut off for almost 20 hours and suffered a 3 day power outage. Accompanying the windstorm was torrential rain, over 100mm recorded over the two days resulting in local flooding. Trentham residents were grateful for the work done by emergency workers in restoring some normality over the 3 days.

July 2021

The coldest month of the year by average. The mildest day was on the 27th with 12.4°C being reached with the coldest night being -5.7°C on the 8th. There were 8 nights where the minimum fell below 0°C. July was also a wet month with 27 days of recorded precipitation giving a monthly total of 192.5mm. The wettest day was 23.4mm on the 15th. By the end of July all streams and creeks were flowing very well, and all water storages were full to overflowing.

August 2021

August saw a more settled month. The mildest day was 17.2°C on the 31st and the coldest night of -4.2°C occurred on the 28th. Rainfall was well below normal with just 61.5mm and the wettest day was the 11th with 16.8mm.

September 2021

As spring consolidated, milder weather developed. The warmest day reached 19.1°C on the 2nd and the coldest night was -2.9°C on the 27th. There were 4 nights below 0°C with late frosts after a mild start to the month. Some frost damage occurred to frost sensitive plants. Rainfall was above the average with 122.8mm occurring over 20 days. With the mild start, pasture commenced spring growth and ground water was very good with all streams continuing to flow well.

Trentham was rocked by a strong earthquake on the 22nd. The epicentre near Rawson / Gippsland measured 5.9 on the Richter scale. The earthquake was strong around the Trentham region and long time locals mentioned that it was the strongest in memory.

October 2021

A near average month in both temperature and rainfall. The warmest day was 22.9°C on the 28th and the coldest night -2.4°C on the 8th. There were 4 nights below 0°C and again sensitive plants suffered frost burn. Rainfall was only slightly below the average returning 94.4mm and the wettest day was 19.4mm on the 1st.

November 2021

Daytime maxima were near the average for November with the warmest day of 26°C on the 30^{th} . A late air frost on the 14^{th} saw a minimum of -1.4°C. There were 2 nights when the temperature fell below 0°C. Rainfall was above the average with 101.8mm and the wettest day recorded 38.8mm on the 9^{th} .

December 2021

December was a warm month with slightly above normal maxima. The warmest day was 32.9°C on the 31st, the coldest night was 2.5°C on the 12th, no frosts were recorded. Rainfall was below average with 47.6mm and the wettest day was on the 9th with 26mm.

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Trentham Weather 2021 (cont.)

Rainfall for 2021 was well above normal with 1284.4mm falling (average 1100mm). The year finished with very good water reserves and excellent pastures. The two notable weather events were the severe frosts of May and the terrible storm of 9th and 10th June.

On another note, not a great deal of snow was recorded. Light falls occurred on the 19th, 25th and 28th July. During

August there was just one snowfall on the 24th with 1 to 2cm around the district. Light snow showers were also recorded on the 20th September.



Trentham Friends of Bees

It's been a tough season for the bees in our region. The cool, wet spring meant the bees started swarming very late (when the bees leave to make a new home), and colonies are well behind in winter preparation.

New colonies will be under pressure to draw wax (make honeycomb) as the queen follows behind, itching to lay eggs to get the colony growing. Bees left behind after a swarm will produce a new queen and wait for her to be mated and start to lay eggs, putting them 2-3 weeks behind schedule.

The amount of food available to the bees is vital. They need to feed the new grubs with pollen, collect enough nectar to fuel daily activity, and ensure enough for winter storage. The warm days and nights over the past few weeks have been a bonus for the foragers (the bees you see on the flowers) as they have been able to work from sun up to sundown. The minimum temperature most bees will tolerate when flying is 13°C. For a hive to fully commit to foraging for food, the temperature must be around 19°C.

Bees can fly in light rain but avoid it by using their uncanny ability to understand the weather. Numerous studies have shown that bees can predict the weather, sometimes even more so than us humans. Not only can they detect when a storm is coming, but they also seem to gauge the severity as well. If beekeepers see overhead clouds and wonder if it's about to rain, they can look at the coming and going of the bees – if many are leaving, it's probably going to be ok, but if hordes of bees are heading back into the hive, it's time to head for shelter.

The food supply in our gardens is critical for the bees, and, unfortunately for proud gardeners, weeds play an essential

role in pollen and nectar availability. Think about letting the clover flower for a few days before mowing as it's an excellent shopping centre for our bees.


Most importantly, avoid using weed killer on warm sunny days when the bees are working their hardest. If you must use weed spray, avoid glyphosate-based weed killers (Roundup) and weed killers that contain Dicamba and only spray between the hours of 8:00 PM and 8:00 AM, when bees are not foraging.

Bees are vital to our planet, and after a rocky start to the season, it's a good feeling to give them a helping hand.

Battery Recycling Program

Annually, Australians purchase enough batteries to twice circle the globe! Imagine this number of batteries being disposed of into landfill and the effects on our environment, water supplies and health of wildlife and humans and our planet!

Batteries contain many valuable and increasingly rare elements, so it makes total sense to recycle. Almost 100% of the components of a battery can be recycled and made into new batteries or other products.

Lions Australia is partnering with Ecycle Solutions based in Melbourne and working across Australia. With 1,200 Lions Clubs and 23,000 Lions members in Australia, we are well placed to make a difference to:

Trentham Tales

Women's Work:

A Reflection in honour of International Women's Day

Reflecting on his younger days living in Spring Hill, Frank Brady told of the tough times his mother endured in those early years. "My poor mother worked like a slave. We had no mod cons – no washing machine, running water. Just a good spring nearby. Mother had a terrible hard life", he recalled back in 2002.

Women, such as Frank's mother, held the large families of early 20th century Trentham and the surrounding districts together. Their individual hardships and circumstances may have varied, but the intensity of their domestic responsibilities demanded not simply a strong work ethic, but a tightly structured weekly routine.

"Monday was wash day" recalled June Moloney, of her grandmother in Little Hampton. "Her copper (washer) was lit early. Clothes were scrubbed on the wash board, the copper filled with cold water and when it came to the boil, my grandmother added the soap she'd made from fat and caustic soda, then stirred the washing with a wooden stick. Each load was rinsed in the trough then wrung out by hand - or later the wringer - before being hung on the wire clothesline."

The water from the washing was never wasted. June remembers her grandmother using the same water to scrub the laundry and outside verandah. At the same time two irons were always being heated in front of the open fire, or later, on the stovetop.

By 1922, those Trentham residents who could afford more luxury embraced electricity, courtesy of the Trewhella Foundry. After household lights, the most common electrical item purchased was an iron. On Tuesdays the Foundry produced extra power - it was, after all, ironing day.



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Nancy Burns recalled that the lighting on Mondays and Tuesdays was generally very poor, its strength depending on "how long it had taken the town's washing to dry".

Friday, June Moloney recalled, was when food was cooked - for the week. "Scones, cakes, biscuits, sponges, pies, jam tarts – it took all day" she said. All made with homemade butter and self-raising flour (plain flour, bicarb of soda and creme of tartar) - initially over an open fire, then later in a wood stove, and then using the "wonderful" slow combustion stove.

June remembered the generated heat brought an added luxury - "hot and cold water laid on!"

Staple goods such as sugar and flour were bought in bulk and when the bags were empty June recalls how "they were made into an apron, a kettle holder, or a protective cover for the head."

"Times were hard in the Depression", said Frank Brady, "but we were still expected to be neatly dressed. We always had second-hand clothes and my mother knitted all our socks". In many homes, the Singer treadle sewing machine was in constant use: mending clothes, splitting & resewing sheets, and tablecloths, turning collars.

World War Two brought both hardship and opportunity for women. The Women's Land Army helped with food production, its recruitment poster describing "a healthful change. If you can't fight, farm". However, for the sisters, wives, and mothers of our district there was little choice - survival of the family farm was dependent on their efforts. During the War and after, paid work for women slowly became a reality, not just in shops and factories but by way of the skills women had been honing their whole life.

"Mum was an excellent cook and could make a very good meal from limited resources" recalled Jean Smallman's daughter, Glenda. "She was able to work at Trentham Bush Hospital as a cook and clean at the O'Hehirs' residence". Glenda felt that being one of sixteen children helped explain her mother's determination and hard work.

Something that was reflected across our region in so many of the women of the time.



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What's in a name?

Does your dog know its name?

It's an essential part of the dog/human relationship (and for safety) that the dog responds when called. Most people overuse their dog's name, and it's a blur in amongst the other blah blah blah that humans vocalise (humans talk too much to their dogs - full stop).

Dogs are able to understand lots of single words, but only when you have paired the same noise with a desired action over time, and in all situations, sit, wait, off, go, outside, drop, are amongst the most common.

Here's your test to see if your dog knows its name in all situations. For the sake of this article, my dog is a female called "Fido".

When your dog is chilling out at home, quietly say her name, "Fido", but only once, and wait for a reaction (dogs hearing is significantly better than humans so there's never a need to shout). Does your dog leap to her feet, look at you directly and attentively, "Sir, yes, Sir?" Maybe she lifts her head, or there's a flick of the ear in your general direction "wut?"

Or is maybe there's no reaction at all? Most dogs in the home will look up when you call their name. Name recognition in dogs and response time can be sharper depending on the dog's proximity to the kitchen!

Good job, your dog knows her name and you have paired a human sound (word) with the fact that you are addressing her specifically.

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Ok, now do the same thing in the garden. Have you lost that magic power to get your dog's attention? Now try on a walk, are you being completely ignored? This is where most dogs do not have a name outside of the house and owners revert to repeatedly calling the dog's name in vain.

How to teach Fido her name in all situations (not for deaf dogs). Do this exercise multiple times a day for 5 mins each time.

Start in the house and then progress to the garden. Have a leash on Fido (so she doesn't take off) and some food in your hand (if weight is an issue, use the dog's kibble/daily food allocation). If kibble is boring for the dog, try a higher value food like chicken that usually gets attention.

Step One: When the dog is looking at you say "Fido" (once) and reward the dog. No other command or behaviour is needed (dog shouldn't be asked to sit or drop). Do that ten times. If you have zero reaction, put the food in front of the dog's nose and lure her head around so she is looking at you before you release the treat.

Step Two: Wait for Fido to be slightly distracted (she may just look away), and again say "Fido", reward when she voluntarily looks at you. If you say her name and she doesn't respond within 10 seconds don't fall into the trap off saying her name over and over, go back to Step One or go back to a lower distraction area. Do this until your dog consistently looks at you when you say her name.

Step Three: Gradually increase the distractions, maybe the front of the house or on a quiet walk. Then progress to walking along the main street or sitting having coffee. If you do not get a response in high distraction areas, go back a step or try again in lower distraction areas.

Once you have full name recognition in all places and situations, phase out the food, maybe every second reward is a pat, then only every third response gets a pat or a treat (avoid patterns, be random, dogs pick up patterns quickly and use to their advantage), phase out food reward over time and then randomly reward for a good response. You are putting the dog's name into muscle memory; however, you may need to top it up now and then.

Only use the dog's name to gain her attention and NEVER when in trouble – otherwise it loses its power and meaning and could be a signal to run and hide. Once you have your dog's attention give the dog a command and remember not to constantly repeat the dog's name. Don't do this: "sit Fido, wait Fido, drop Fido". The dog's name is only for attention getting.

Most importantly, BE PATIENT and practise; your dog is not being naughty or trying to trick you; she hasn't been taught!



Accompanied by partners and with wine bags filled with local Enders Hill wine the Plonkers wandered down to Rachael and Ethan's Twinkle Town food truck. Both wine and food van are relatively new additions to Trentham hospitality offerings. Twinkle Town recently celebrated their first birthday with flashing cameras and a visit by supermodel Stefania Ferrario.

With Sophie the Zebra and Big Boy Gorilla, perched under the pavilion on cushioned packing cases we had a delightful meal in a relaxed, cool garden setting.

Perhaps more by luck than planning, the wines were a perfect accompaniment to the super tasty vegan fare on offer.

Despite COVID restrictions severely impacting the weekend tourist trade, Rachael and Ethan's big adventure has been a great success because of their unwavering belief in top quality, no fuss food and a strong following of faithful locals yearning for more of their fine fare.

Trentham's very own winery, Enders Hill <u>endershill.com.au</u> also had to battle the impact of the COVID plus the June Storm and the trade war with China which impacted wine prices across the country.

The winery was started in 2016 when master winemaker Rohan Meggs bought Enders Hill farm and planted the first vines. Rohan had spent many years working for large scale volume wineries and wanted a change. He was determined to produce quality wine for 'everyday Australians who love a good drop at a fair price' – and the Plonkers reckon he has exceeded in that quest.

We matched Twinkle Town's entrees of Crispy Chickpea Fingers, Tomato Provencal, and White Bean Skordalia with a 2021 Enders Hill Gruner Veltliner.

On to the review! The entrees were sensational, the crispy chickpea fingers were perfectly cooked and contrasted wonderfully with the astringent tomatoes and creamy bean dip. (as usual, Niles had to be scolded for double-dipping with the chickpea fingers and dip).

The Gruner Veltliner was a fresh, vibrant wine with good length and a dry lemon and lime aftertaste. If these young vines can produce wine of this calibre, Digby is excited about their prospects in a few years as they mature, and their roots drive deeper into the subsoil.

Digby then had a vegan carbonara which he raved about, whilst the rest had tangy Tofu Banh Mi rolls that put even the best Richmond Vietnamase offerings to shame.

With a side of fries, we accompanied the mains with a 2021 Enders Hill Chardonnay – a very drinkable drop with a more than fair \$25 price tag. Rohan's chardonnay was not the old world heavily oaked variety of yesteryear which Niles still loves, but rather an easy-drinking, well-balanced wine with just the right amount of oak to enhance the flavour and depth of the wine- a perfect accompaniment to a light summer meal.

After a cleansing Ale or two at home later, the Plonkers reflected on the future of this winery which will only grow in stature over coming years and a vegan food truck that is already overtaking the big boys in culinary experiences.

Greener Golf

Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas announced the local community organisations who will share in funding to deliver projects that will reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 1,695 tonnes annually, while slashing energy bills.

Sustainability Victoria's Community Climate Change and Energy Action program helps organisations reduce greenhouse gas emissions and improve energy efficiency, making community facilities cheaper to run and more comfortable year-round.

Trentham Golf Club was one of the successful recipients, and in conjuction with support from Hepburn Wind and the Hepburn Solar Bulk Buy Program will install two Tesla Powerwall batteries with a storage capacity of 28kWh.

The batteries will further reduce the club's carbon footprint and complement the current 12kW solar system by offsetting night time grid usage of electricity by the clubhouse refrigeration and the irrigation bore. Their fleet of six lithium-ion electric hire golf carts will be fully "solar powered". In the future the club will look at further expanding the solar system, with the aim of installing one or two electric car charging points as the demand for electric vehicles increases.

Congratulations and credit to Colin Wilson (TGC) and Taryn Lane (Hepburn Wind) for their work on the successful grant application.
