TRENTHAM PROJECT UPDATE

Trentham Community Hub

Works are underway at the Trentham Community Hub. The Hub, located at the Trentham Mechanics Institute on High Street, will incorporate a community library, Council customer service centre, visitor information services, large community hall, commercial-style kitchen, playgroup area, on-site parking and landscaped surrounds.

Some trees were removed from the site earlier this month, and equipment is now on-site to realign the sewerage system. The main contractor will commence in early May.

We are very excited to see this important project underway – stay tuned for regular updates.

Trentham Sportsground Pavilion Redevelopment

Works are progressing well and according to schedule. The main floor slab has been poured and structural steel framing is expected to be on-site from early May.

Temporary facilities are currently being established to allow for the continuation of training and matches.



AQUATICS STRATEGY

ADOPTED

The Aquatics Strategy was adopted at the April 2022 Council meeting held last week. It provides a 10-year priority plan to guide the future strategic direction, and maximise participation and programming opportunities to contribute to the health, wellbeing and liveability of the communities of Hepburn Shire.

There has been a significant amount of planning and community and stakeholder engagement to inform the development of the strategy, with input from residents and sporting groups, along with Sport and Recreation Victoria, Daylesford Indoor Aquatic Centre (DIAC) Advocacy Group, Creswick and District Aquatic Centre Advocacy Group and Central Highlands Rural Health. The Asset Plan has a ten year outlook and addresses how the Council proposes to manage its portfolio of assets to ensure they are developed, renewed or maintained to facilitate the delivery of Council services. It is strongly linked to the Council Plan and Financial Plan, and is critical to the service planning and delivery along with the efficient use of available resources.



SPUD HUT BUS TOUR:

This tour visits three huts that were provided to the "Spud Diggers" - seasonal workers who came to the district for the potato season, then moved on when the crops had all been lifted. Their farmer employers provided a hut for accommodation, with no running water or electricity. Occasionally, a digger would be allowed to remain in his hut between seasons and sometimes that became a semi-permanent arrangement.

Tours run for about an hour and depart from the Railway Station at 11am, 12.30pm & 2pm. Tickets are available from the Info Tent - \$10 each; family of 4 for \$30 - all proceeds support the Historical Society.

The Trentham Garden

Sustainability: How to Make a Beautiful Garden

Beauty is not in the face; beauty is a light in the heart. Khalil Gibran

What's more lovely than spending time with friends outside with a drink in hand, seeing children playing in a garden, or local wildlife gathering around your very own pond? Gardens are at their best when they have a sense of beauty which goes beyond superficial appearances.

It's imperative to create spaces in a garden to enjoy spending time in to sit, eat and entertain. In contrast to Melbourne, Trentham clients often choose to locate these areas in places which receive sun and reflected heat to prolong the time they can spend outside.

Insects and animals are some of the main users of a garden and benefit from multi-level planting of trees, shrubs and groundcovers, and access to water. An indigenous section of the garden can add a great educational aspect that doesn't require additional irrigation or high 'inputs' to maintain, as well as great habitat for local critters.

Great Dixter garden in the UK recently did a study and surprisingly found that there was more diversity of wildlife in the garden itself than the surrounding more natural areas. The various habitats provided by the crumbly old stone buildings, rich planting and water features create a diverse range of habitats for local insects.

Soft-space elements (trees and plants) are generally more sustainable than paving or decking. Sometimes a water-permeable gravel area can be cheaper, softer-looking and better for the environment than a paved area. Recycled and locally sourced materials generally have lower 'embodied energy' than imported materials.

The quality of the design and build is also crucial: there is no point in creating a garden which needs to be re-done in a couple of years. Make your garden a beautiful place that both you and nature can enjoy together.

Power Outages and Essential Services

Thursday 19 May, 7.30 pm Trentham Neighbourhood Centre



Representatives from local and regional essential services have been invited to speak and answer questions at a community forum on 19 May in Trentham. This important event is the first of a series of activities planned during May and June.

The **Blackout Action Group** was recently formed by TSG in response to on-going unplanned power outages and the major disruption to essential services (power, communications and water) over an extended period following the June 2021 storm.

Powercor, the CFA and Coliban Water have indicated their participation. Telstra and Optus have also been invited to attend.

This and subsequent forums will contribute to the Energy & Climate Resilient Trentham project which aims to improve power reliability and promote renewable generation. TSG is grateful to Coliban Water for the Community Rebate which is supporting these forums.

We know interruptions to the power supply are annoying and can be serious. This is your chance to learn more about how our essential services are responding to these challenges and how our community can support better services and encourage climate action.

Going on the Railways

Throughout the 1860s and '70s there was a widespread demand for timber, be it for firewood, construction materials, mine supports or mechanical parts. Timber was vital to the 1850s goldrush in our district, underpinning the later commercial mines of the area and becoming the mainstay of the colonial expansion, climaxing in the boom days of 'Marvellous Melbourne'.

In great demand, timber from the Wombat Forest faced serious challenges, including transporting lumber to market. Early mobile timber cutting camps relied on the only transport and haulage commodity available - draught horses. Jinkers hauled the big timber out of the forest. A tree weighing up to one ton would be dragged by a single draught horse, which in those days cost 50 pounds. While the larger commercial sawmills later built tram tracks, they also relied heavily on horsepower to transport their lumber in drays to the Kyneton rail depot, using roads that barely existed.

Around the same time the government was also opening up agricultural land, with the aim of providing employment for ex-goldminers. Potato farming, which was already undertaken in small ventures, was actively supported for development in the district, but farmers also faced their own transport problems.

For most growers the arduous journey to Kyneton with their goods was an overnighter.

The expanding timber and potato industries were clearly in need of more convenient transport and in January 1879, the Carlsruhe-Daylesford line began construction.

The Trentham leg was completed in February 1880 and a month later reached Daylesford.



"Every hamlet saw the railway as its passport to prosperity," wrote Murrell Osborne in his descriptive history, 'Timber, Spuds & Spa'.

Before long the railway itself became a reliable source of employment. All through the night lanterns would be burning at the station with men loading and unloading freight into rail trucks or preparing livestock for transport.



'Going on the railways' became the ambition of many a young lad.

Outward tonnage of goods on the line increased rapidly in the 1880s. For example, in each of the years between 1884 and 1888, about 20,000 tons of both firewood and timber; 20,000 bags of chaff; 20,000 bags of potatoes; 3,000 bags of peas; 3,000 bags of oats; 1,600 bags of bran, and 180 tons of hides, hay and fruit were moved from the Trentham Station.

On top of the freight came about 50,000 passengers. Trentham Falls became an increasingly popular tourist destination, particularly for walking parties. Their presence benefitted new and existing hotels providing accommodation and respite for tourists and workers alike.

With the delivery of regular mail and availability of newspapers, locals now had better communication with the outside world and isolation for many evaporated. New arrivals also brought new ideas and growth.

Unfortunately, the 1890s depression saw demand for produce reduce, leading to cuts in railway services.

Although the railway maintained its fundamental importance into the early 20th Century, with a brief resurgence in the mid-1920s, the peak levels of the 1880s boom years were never revisited.

So next time you visit the old Trentham station (editor's note: maybe at Spudfest?!) just take a moment and reflect on the days 140 or so years ago when it served such a vital commercial and cultural link with the rest of Victoria.

Councillor's Report

Anzac Day – congratulations to Trentham Lions Club and Kyneton RSL for staging a wonderful ceremony. An excellent crowd was in attendance and

a feature of proceedings was the contribution by Trentham Primary School students who presented and spoke so beautifully.

Community Centre – construction work is underway, with Coliban Water realigning their infrastructure as an important first step.

Sportsground – work continues on-track for an October completion. Council has arranged for temporary buildings onsite to provide changeroom facilities.

Planning survey – if you haven't already completed the planning survey (thetrenthamtrumpet.com.au/survey) please do so. The community's feedback will guide the new planning regulations so that they reflect the community's wishes and protect against undesirable development outcomes.

Storm recovery works – Council continues to advocate for more funding from the State government. It is anticipated that upcoming programs will include

- A habitat program to support wildlife back into storm affected areas in partnership with DELWP.
- A Public Clean-Up program Council has submitted the highest priorities for this fund as the restoration of: Wombat Trail; Stony Creek Reserve; Domino Trail; Daylesford Spa Country Railway; Wallaby Drive, Wheatsheaf (fire access track).
- A Community Support Fund
- Community Clean Up Support Program- under a joint application with Moorabool and Macedon Ranges Councils.

Rex – the process to engage with the community on the proposed sale of the Rex building in Daylesford is expected to start in late April and will run for one month. This is a contentious project with implications for Council's finances and it is critical that input is received from across Hepburn shire before a final decision on the building's fate is confirmed. I encourage you to complete the survey (see page 22).

Creek renaming - At the April meeting Council resolved to request Geographic Names Victoria to rename the Jim Crow Creek to Larni Barramal Yaluk. Council has worked closely with project partners, Mount Alexander Shire Council, North Central Catchment Management Authority and Dja Dja Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation on the proposed renaming of Jim Crow Creek for some time. The decision to recommend the renaming has occurred in recognition of Aboriginal heritage, the importance of reinstating Dja Dja Wurrung language and the removal of a name that is offensive and derogatory.

Grants – April saw the Trentham & District Historical Society and Trentham Lions Club successful in their grant applications for the Timeline Project (\$2500) and "firewood for the needy" (\$2000) respectively. Both very worthy and deserving initiatives for the benefit of the community.

Aquatic strategy – Council has resolved to adopt the proposed aquatic strategy, with further work to be undertaken on the potential creation of an indoor heated pool for the shire and the necessary repair works to existing pools.

2022/23 budget – work is underway to compile the budget for next financial year. A draft will be released for public comment. More detail will follow on which projects may be included for Trentham.

TNC – congratulations to Trentham Neighbourhood Centre who recently celebrated their 30th birthday. To have sustained such valuable service to the community for such a lengthy period is a tribute to all involved.

Spudfest – please mark May 7 in your diary as Trentham's iconic festival is back... and sure to be bigger than ever.

Council – monthly meetings will be held at the new starting time of 5.30pm on the third Tuesday of the month. The public's attendance in-person will be determined according to prevailing Covid restrictions. At this stage the public may attend in person. Upcoming Council meeting dates – 17 May, 21 June, 19 July.

Anzac Day

Here are the thoughtful words of Cr Brian Hood, delivered on behalf of Council at the Trentham Anzac Day Service.

Today we meet on Dja Dja Wurrung country. I acknowledge the Djaara people, Traditional Custodians of this land, and I pay my respects to their Elders past, present and emerging. I extend that respect to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples who have served Australia in both peace and war.

Anzac Day has become an occasion to honour all who have worn our country's uniform in service. Today, we reflect on that service. We recognise more than 100,000 Australian service men and women who have lost their lives in military operations carried out in our country's name.

We honour the values that have been invested in the original Anzacs – loyalty, selflessness, courage – and the ways in which later generations have measured their own achievements against those of the soldiers who fought on Gallipoli.

For a nation with a population of just 4.5 million the First World War cast a long shadow in the decades that followed. But through every challenge and the darkest of days Australia still showed resilience and perseverance, time and again.

Australia is a nation built on the foundation of mateship – rolling up our sleeves, helping our neighbours and doing it with a smile. The resilience of Australians has been shown through the First World War, the Spanish flu, the Great Depression, the Second World War, Korea, Vietnam and the subsequent conflicts in East Timor, Iraq and Afghanistan. That we have persevered through bushfires, floods and coronavirus, among other things, is nothing short of remarkable.

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Australia has fought and stood for something, every time its freedoms and way of life were threatened.

On Anzac Day, it is important that we come together, pause, remember and honour those heroes who have shaped the very fabric of the nation that we hold dear today. We honour those whose names appear on the many memorials across Hepburn Shiro



We remember and honour the 47 from Trentham who made the ultimate sacrifice in WWI; the 14 who died in WWII; and especially the four families who lost two of their sons.

That is a remarkable contribution from such a small community.

The freedoms we enjoy today were won by others, such as those named on our memorials.

What we can do is to honour the two million women and men who have worn this nation's uniform. Their service and sacrifice is not in vain.

It was not in vain, if we remember. It was not in vain, because we remember. Today, we remember.

Lest we forget.

Gardens for Wildlife

Three Bs or not To Be – Birds, Bees, and Butterflies in your habitat garden

Often we think of biodiversity in terms of the larger animals, hoping to see a wombat, an echidna or a platypus. But of course, much of our biodiversity is also found with the smaller creatures down to the micro-organisms, all contributing significantly to the big picture.



When deciding to add local native plants to your home garden it's easy to focus on the three Bs, birds, bees and butterflies as a good starting point. Our local season has recently been featuring the various grasses all of which contribute to butterfly habitat – weeping grass, wallaby and kangaroo grasses, Poas, Dianellas. Then the smaller flowering everlastings and groundcovers, Brachyscome Cut-leaf daisy, Chocolate and Bulbine lilies add more variety and colours.

Smaller birds need safe shelter, usually in prickly bushes and some of our good local species are Acacias "Prickly Moses" and Paradoxa, the Cassinia aculeata, Prickly Tea-tree and Sweet Bursaria. We're learning more about our native bees but many of the plants already listed will provide for them too – more to come!

You can learn more about gardening for wildlife at the second of our two workshops, on Saturday 28 May. This is part of TNC's "School of Gardening". Presenters will be

Jill Teschendorff, author of "Grow Wild" and Brian Bainbridge, Biodiversity Officer for the Hepburn Shire with extensive knowledge and experience in this field.

Theory covered in this course includes: Introduction to the breadth of biodiversity in the garden; Food web in the garden; Preserving habitat; Lizard lounges.



Register through Trentham Neighbourhood Centre where you can also register for a home visit from our mentors to help you plan your habitat garden.

Is Hepburn Shire Council viable?

The Kennett government amalgamation of municipalities, mid-1990s, was designed for the regional centres. Five separate councils became the City of Greater Bendigo ending years of wasteful competition and duplication. The government then proceeded to roll-out a '3-4-5 equals one' model to the rest of Victoria – without the consultation and time for acceptance given the regional centres. Boundaries were largely drawn by the metro bureaucracy to create new municipalities each with their own challenges: geographic, socio-historical and financial.

Hepburn Shire, which has been described as a platypus*, was one such. There was no wider debate about what was the best municipal configuration between Ballarat and Bendigo. Informed advice is that Trentham was still included with the rest of the former Kyneton Shire in the new Macedon Ranges until a week before the new municipalities were announced. Apparently someone had a last look at Hepburn and concluded that it didn't stack up financially, resulting in Trentham's late inclusion. For the next 25 years Trentham (and Coliban Ward) has cross-subsidised the rest of Hepburn: and still does – refer Cr Hood's total rates comparisons (March Trumpet). A 2010 State review identified 14 'non-viable' councils – including Hepburn.

Cr Hood's April report paints a precarious picture of Hepburn Shire Council today: negative cash reserves; planning backlogs; project management issues, notably the REX fiasco; no strategies for managing built assets or the workforce; and declining services.

Comparing Trentham with Macedon Ranges is instructive - the rate (cents in the dollar): Hepburn 0.29270 Macedon Ranges 0.23310... that's over \$400 difference on a property valued at \$700,000. Residential waste & recycling charges: Hepburn \$479 Macedon Ranges \$498. For the additional \$19 we'd get 4 bins *plus year-round free green waste* at the transfer station.

If we argue that municipal councillors have responsibilities similar to company directors, i.e. a primary duty to the best interests of ratepayers or shareholders respectively, should we be asking our Council to implement a searching investigation into the viability of Hepburn Shire Council and the value-for-money it is able to deliver to its residents? In any case a review of local government 25+ years after amalgamation is overdue.

Wombat Forest Salvage

The clean-up and salvage of fallen trees in the Wombat State Forest following the June 2021cyclonic storm event has finally begun in one of the hardest hit areas near Lyonville. Harvest and haulage contractors have been doing an impressive job which will enhance forest safety, amenity and access for a future National Park and importantly reduce fire hazards near the township prior to next fire season.

It's sad and hard to fathom why some people would see the need to protest about these restorative works finally being undertaken as they did on Good Friday. The timber is also being utilised at a time when there is a real shortage of this valuable resource, and all hollow and moss-covered logs are retained for ground habitat along with others to meet Ecological Vegetation Class benchmarks.

postscript - I believe all the royalties for the fallen trees salvaged will go to the Dja Dja Wurrung traditional owners - a great outcome.

Eating Your Garden

Lemon Potatoes

In honor of Spudfest, here's our current favourite potato recipe.

If it weren't for the lemon (which is non-negotiable!) this could be the perfect Trentham recipe as potatoes, garlic and oregano are top growers here.

A starchy potato will soak up the juices best, but Dutch creams are also delicious. Allow an hour and a half to prepare, but the oven does the heavy lifting, your effort is minimal! These are the perfect accompliment to lamb. Serves 4

Ingredients:

- 1.2kg potatoes
- 1 1/2 cups of chicken stock
- 1/2 cup of olive oil
- 1/3 cup lemon juice
- Zest of one lemon
- 5 garlic cloves chopped finely
- 1 tbsp dried oregano
- 2 tsp salt

Method

Preheat oven to 200°C Peel and cut potatoes into chunky wedges.

Combine all ingredients in a heavy roasting pan, add potatoes and turn to coat well.

Roast for 30 minutes, remove from oven to turn potatoes, and baste with the reducing liquid.

Return to oven and roast for another 20 minutes, by which time most of the liquid will have evaporateed or been absorbed by the potatoes.

Oil, zest and garlic will remain in the bottom of the pan, toss potatoes through this again, and roast for a further 20 minutes to crisp and brown.

Keep a close eye on your potatoes at this time, you don't want the garlic to burn.

Serve with any remaining garlicky lemony oil drizzled over the top, garnish with fresh oregano and lemon slices.

Gustav in the Bedroom

During the Easter long weekend I decided to finish painting our guest bedroom.

After emptying the room, patching cracks in the walls, placing drop sheets, and covering windows, we were ready to paint the ceiling. I strongly recommend using a good quality ceiling paint - it makes a tricky job so much easier.

In the past, I have used combinations of different colours when painting ceilings, highlighting ceiling roses, cornices, and picture rails. More recently, I tend to use the same single colour for the ceiling and the portion of the walls above the picture rail, often using a standard off-white to keep things simple.

For the walls I chose Dulux's Gustav: it's an interesting, moody grey. This time, I decided to use Gustav mixed to half-strength, creating a true "greige" with a mauve undertone. I highlighted wardrobe doors, skirting boards, and window frames in white.

Gustav's warm undertones work well with a timber side chair, bedside table, and the mahogany mantlepiece. Being a grey-beige combination, Gustav really is a fantastic neutral: multiple textile colours in the room can be readily interchanged.

I dressed the bed with white duvets and sleeping pillows. If I didn't have an upholstered headboard, I would use

European pillows against the painted wall, to give the room a little height visually. I purchased some off-white readymade drapes with blackout lining. A few striped cushions and an adjustable reading lamp made the space inviting.

I finished off the room with a simple round paper shade for the ceiling light fitting; a large coir rug makes the

room casual and comfortable.

All is now ready for our guests, and Gustav is a colour I'm thinking of using more often with my clients.


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Trentham Saints

Course notes

Our focus is currently to increase root depth of the greens. The deep coring recently undertaken was a first step. A good example of poor root depth was where damage occurred during the coring process on the 14th and 17th greens due to shallow root growth causing the turf to lift. Greens were rolled with a 1-tonne roller after coring to smooth them out. The 1st and 12th greens had noticeable amounts of Thatch Collapse, a fungus that causes the thatch to collapse in on itself and create a crater.

Tees and surrounds have found to be infested with Redheaded Cockchafers that have been attacking the roots and causing bare patches. We are looking at the option of nematodes as the best method of control.

A massive thank you to all the volunteers who helped clean up the cores and prepare the greens for top dressing. Your time and effort certainly helped speed up the process. Volunteers are always needed for firewood, garden beds and rough mowing whenever available.

Sale of the Rex

Consultation Commences

In November 2021, Council decided not to proceed with the Hepburn Hub project at The Rex building in Vincent Street, Daylesford. Council purchased the building in 2016 to accommodate a new library, Council offices, public toilets, community auditorium and community co-working space. Some building works had begun before the project ceased.

Mayor, Cr Tim Drylie, said that "Councillors made a difficult decision to end the Hepburn Hub project and undertake a process to sell The Rex building, understanding that it would result in mixed feelings in the community."

"Council recognises the benefits of the services and facilities the Hepburn Hub at The Rex would have offered, however, the uncertainty of the final cost, previous construction issues, Council's financial position and the financial impacts of COVID, storm recovery and operating in a rate capping environment, meant Council determined the additional costs and other risks were too much to incur."

"While at this point, we don't see a clear purpose for retaining The Rex, given the lack of finances to undertake any works at the site, if there is strong community support for using The Rex for a worthwhile and suitable purpose, we may be open to exploring alternate ideas, but they would need to be assessed for financial viability and on a range of other factors," said Cr Tim Drylie.

Council is inviting individuals and community groups to complete a short survey regarding the intended sale of The Rex building. Community groups are encouraged to discuss the proposed sale with their

members. Council is not seeking detailed submissions or business cases.

"We encourage groups from across the Shire to take advantage of the discussion pack that has been created and make a submission on the intended sale of The Rex," said Cr Tim Drylie.

More information on the survey and the discussion paper is available on our Participate Hepburn website.

"It is important to note that Council will not revive the Hepburn Hub at The Rex project. We understand the disappointment many people are feeling now we are beginning the sale process. However, it is important we focus our energies on the next step: to undertake a planning project that will review possible solutions of staffing accommodation and community facilities that were to be included in the Hepburn Hub," said Cr Tim Drylie.

Submissions can be made until 5pm on Friday 20 May 2022. It is expected that Council will make a decision on the sale of the building at its June or July meeting.
