Works are underway at the Trentham Community Hub. The Hub, located at the Trentham Mechanics Institute on High Street, will incorporate a community library, Council customer service centre, visitor information services, large community hall, commercial-style kitchen, playgroup area, on-site parking and landscaped surrounds.

All nominated trees have been removed from site and the sewer realignment has been completed. The contractor will soon establish their site compound with the demolition and main works to commence shortly. We are pleased to see this important project underway – stay tuned for regular updates.





#### TYLDEN BOUNDARY WORKS

Works will soon start to replace the culvert on James Lane in Tylden. This project is on a boundary road with our neighbour to the east, Macedon Ranges Shire Council. The project is co-funded by both councils and federal grant funding through the Bridge Renewal Program. Construction is expected to take two weeks. Traffic management and detours will be in place. Thank you for your patience.

The three-day courses will enable participants to link into community groups and make use of their skills to clear their own property of downed trees and assist other impacted community members with the clean up. Big things are happening with the new pavilion at the Trentham Sportsground, sections of the steel frame are now in place. Another section of frame for the veranda will be installed soon, which will give a sense of the size of the new building. Construction is on track to be completed later this year. Temporary facilities are up and running throughout the footy and netball season while the project is underway.


And thank you also to the community groups, volunteers and individuals who continue to work so hard to repair



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#### Adam, The Good Baker

Trentham is well known for its bakeries attracting locals and tourists from far and wide. Could the town support another baker? Absolutely we say!

Welcome to baker Adam Kluga whose Sicilian heritage instilled in him a love in all things food. November of '21 saw him take up his dream of starting his own bakery business right here in Trentham delivering to 3458 (online orders at



thegoodbaker.com.au) and selling at Ruby Goose on Tuesdays.

The Trumpet recently sat down with Adam to chat about his passion for baking.

# How long have you lived in Trentham and what drew you here/keeps you here?

I've lived in Trentham for about 3 years now. My partner and I had always envisioned moving to a more rural area and had been looking at a plethora of houses in many different areas. We fell in love with the little home we now live in at first sight, and we adore the community too. It's a beautiful, peaceful and quiet place filled with kind, caring people who have given me help and support in so many ways.

#### What got you started in baking?

I've always had an intrinsic interest in baking, and cooking more generally. I come from a background where all social events pivot on food, and so it seemed only natural that I'd always have an interest in it. I spent a lot of my formative years with my Nonna Rita, who instilled in me a passion for good, simple cooking. My Nonno Frank was actually a baker for most of his life and also taught Nonna to bake.

#### Tell us more about your business?

Everything I offer for sale is made only with sourdough starter/wild yeast. I think making breads this way gives really great results and has innumerable health benefits compared to "off the shelf" supermarket-style breads. So, my focus is to offer these high quality breads to the local community for them to enjoy and share with their families.

I have a stable of "core" loaves available every week, and bring certain specials in and out to keep things interesting. I'm constantly trying to think of new ideas for things I can offer to the community. So far I've predominantly sold my wares through some retail at Ruby Goose Foods as well as deliveries via online orders. That said, I'm currently exploring the possibility of setting up a more permanent location and/or trying out some local farmers' markets.

**Did you learn to bake sourdough during lockdown?!**No, I started taking sourdough baking more seriously in 2019, prior to the pandemic. I started cultivating a bit of an online following in 2021 and then soft-launched the

business in November that year.

Naturally, I'm fond of all the loaves I make! My personal favourite is the "Pane di Casa", which is my riff on a hardy, Italian-style table bread. It seems to have been really popular with my customers as well, as it's been the top-seller of late. People *really* seem to love the fruit loaf when I bring that on the menu every once in a while, as well.



Though I try to make sure I have something available for a wide array of tastes and needs.

**Draft 22/23 budget** – Council's draft budget for 22/23 is currently available for review. Community members are encouraged to make a submission, ahead of the 28 June meeting when the budget is due to be adopted.

Coliban ward projects funded in the draft budget include -

Shire-wide budget allocations include an additional \$7m for storm recovery works; \$263k for urgent works to swimming pools and \$90k for the walking and cycling strategy. Investment of \$5.8m for roads, drainage and footpaths/cycleways is also planned.

**Community Centre** – construction work is expected to commence in late May with the removal of asbestos. Coliban Water have realigned their infrastructure and some other preliminary works have been completed.

**Sportsground** – work continues on-track for an October completion. Council has arranged for temporary buildings onsite to provide changeroom facilities.

Planning survey – if you haven't already completed the planning survey (thetrenthamtrumpet.com.au/survey) please do so. The community's feedback will guide the new planning regulations so they reflect the community's wishes and protect against undesirable development outcomes. Recently local residents, in Coliban ward and across the Shire, have lodged well-constructed objections to proposed developments, and provision of compelling cases against inappropriate development are influential.

"No barrier" Positive Ageing Strategy - The strategy has been developed using extensive research, including local data and information received from community and stakeholder engagement. It includes 8 'focus areas' with a number of 'objectives'. The focus areas align with key topics in ageing identified by the Commissioner for Senior Victorians and the World Health Organisation. Council welcomes your feedback on the 'No Barrier' Positive Ageing Strategy via the survey or by sending a completed hard copy via mail. Your feedback will help us finalise the draft Strategy. participate.hepburn.vic.gov.au/positive-ageing

Off-leash dog park – following consultation with representatives of the "Dogs of Trentham" community group a trial will be conducted at the Market St Reserve. Changes will be made to signage and fencing erected to enable the off-leash exercise of our canine friends to continue safely at that location. The group continues to work with Council to identify a suitable long-term site and define the park's needs.

Arts & Culture strategy — Council is inviting the community to help set key directions for the very first Hepburn Arts and Culture Strategy. Arts and culture can mean different things to different people, but supporting creative initiatives helps to grow and sustain local talent, gives emphasis to our diverse traditions and abilities, and connects us in inclusive and meaningful ways so that everyone has an opportunity to flourish. **Rex** – the process to engage with the community on the proposed sale of the Rex building in Daylesford is now closed. This is a contentious project with significant implications for Council's finances. Councillors will closely consider feedback provided by the broader community before a final decision on the building's fate is confirmed.

**Spudfest** – congratulations to the organising committee and their army of volunteers for successfully conducting another edition of Trentham's iconic festival. The community support of this important event was evident.

Power resilience – congratulations to the Trentham Sustainability Group (TSG) for organising a very informative community workshop on the project to improve the resilience of our electricity supply. Powercor, Telstra and Coliban Water all gave presentations on their plans to strengthen their respective networks. Another two workshops are planned and residents are encouraged to attend. The project is a joint effort sponsored by TSG, Council and Trentham & Districts Community Bank.

**Council** – monthly meetings will be held at the new starting time of 5.30pm on the third Tuesday of the month. At this stage the public may attend in person (while no COVID restrictions apply)

#### **Trentham Reserves Committee of Management**

The Stony Creek, Trent Creek and Old Racecourse Reserves are managed by a volunteer committee, the Trentham Reserves Committee of Management.

The Committee has worked for many years to restore and revegetate the Reserves as well as create and maintain the Wombat Trail.

The last 12 months have been particularly difficult for the Committee in terms of damage done to our Reserves and Trails following the big storm in June and floods causing tracks to be washed away. It has been a long wait for assistance from DELWP and Hepburn Shire/Storm recovery teams.

The Old Racecourse Reserve walking track is now cleared.

The walking track through Stony Ck Reserve is open, but the section off Stony Ck Res, called the Wombat Loop, is again closed due to unstable trees overhanging the path.

Trent Ck Reserve lost many trees during the storm event.

While most of these have been removed, tracks and access to the old pool area have not been reopened. A lot of work to do there!

Friends of Trentham Creeks & Reserves is a volunteerworking group which carries out weeding, brush-cutting and planting on the Reserves.

#### The Great Trentham Spudfest

#### Spudfest 2022

Weather-wise, May 7 was far from an ideal day, but that didn't stop the 2022 version of The Great Spudfest being a great success. The cold, fog, drizzle, and rain were treated as a mild inconvenience by the thousands of people - locals and visitors alike - who arrived to celebrate all things potato and experience a bunch of other food and fun.



The festival has several goals: to celebrate our favourite local crop - the humble potato, to lift the spirits of the community (especially as we slowly recover from the trials of the past couple of years) and to provide a fundraising opportunity for some of our wonderful community groups.

It was a success by all those measures!

Parents from the Primary School ran the face painting stall & petting zoo and collected \$2200. The kindergarten parents looked after the Mini Golf and created a "pop-up" Potato & Leek Soup stall in the Carriage Café which quickly sold out. These two activities put \$1150 in their coffers.



The Historical Society ran their wonderful Spud Hut bus tours to rave reviews for a fundraising result of \$700 and our CFA raised \$1000 through sales of their famous local double-fried chips and, new for this year, potato cakes.



Funds from entry donations, horse & cart rides and the very popular Devonshire Tea stall on the Railway Station platform will be used to boost these fundraising efforts by an additional 50%, as well as topping up the Spudfest Latrobe University Agribusiness Bursary to support a



student in the second year of their academic journey.

We are very grateful to our major sponsors - Hepburn Shire Council, Trentham & Districts Community Bank and Keane & Co. Real Estate, as well as the generosity of Country Grocers IGA Trentham for providing the supplies for the Devonshire Tea stall and the Thank You BBQ held for our Spudbuddies.

Spudfest is one of the biggest events of our community calendar.

To share a few more numbers: this year, we brought together thirteen local bands. nine food stalls, eight committee members, five community groups, four spud farmer families, three fabulous sponsors, one

#### **Power Outages and Essential Services**

Locals attending the TSG community information forum on 19 May, were treated to a line-up of top speakers from Coliban Water, CFA, Powercor and Telstra who outlined what their respective organisations are doing to ensure continuity of services when power outages occur and answer questions.

We left with a much better understanding of measures already taken and planned, reassured that the agencies actively coordinate their activities and with a clear message that power reliability and good communications are fundamental in dealing with any emergency. The forum was chaired by Cr Brian Hood who represents Council on the Municipal Emergency Management Planning Committee which comprises HSC, SES, CFA, DELWP, Vic Police, Red Cross & Dept of Health.

Each of the essential services agencies could have commanded the whole forum and filled all of this report which, for brevity, will focus on Powercor for the centrality of their role.

Powercor's Jo Parfumi, General Manager, Corporate Affairs, outlined their resilience strategy, based on a national report, and the need to balance costs and safety (e.g. undergrounding) which they must negotiate with the regulator. This was explained relative to the local supply and outages over the past year by Powercor Major Client Manager, Richard Scholten.

Trentham's power supply comes via the Woodend long radial line: originally designed for the 1950s/60s. This feeder comprises 257km of overhead lines and 110km of underground cable, serving 2,600 customers (2,330 residential and 270 commercial/industrial).

Greater reliability and world leading bushfire safety are being achieved with the addition of a Rapid Earth Fault Current Limiter at Woodend. Installed at a cost of approx \$10M plus line upgrades, the REFCL is delivering measurable safety benefits to customers as it successfully activated 100 times over the past summer fire danger season preventing possible fire starts while maintaining power supply to all customers 85 of these times. Additional reliability is being trialled in Trentham and Blackwood with the installation of cutting edge Automatic Circuit Reclosers technology which will further reduce power outage durations.

The extended outage resulting from the 1 in 500 year storm last June resulted in significant re-construction of the

Powercor network at the time. As the powerline to Trentham and Blackwood is radial. there is no option to back feed these areas which impacted restoration times. The multiple outages experienced in Feb-March this year were finally tracked



down to a single faulty high voltage fuse in Blackwood similar to the one in the image above.

Sebastian Klein, TSG Project Leader, concluded the session with a brief overview of the current feasibility study into how greater resilience can be built into 5 essential service sites in Trentham and the potential for households and a whole town microgrid. The results of this study will be the subject of a further community information session after the 'What can Trentham learn from other towns' forum 16 June – see p 22 for details.

TSG would like to thank the six speakers who contributed to the 'Outages' session some of whom had travelled considerable distances and will post links to further information they have provided on our website. We also acknowledge the Coliban Water Community Rebate which has enabled us to present these information sessions.

#### Gardens for Wildlife

A busy time with two workshops has been productive in promoting how to develop habitat gardening. The first event on 30 April with Elspeth Swan from the Moorabool G4W group provided a great introduction to native biodiversity, and the interconnectedness of all living things, including us! Information in the Hepburn Shire Council Strategy demonstrated the local state of biodiversity and relates to the role.

the local state of biodiversity and relates to the role that home gardens can play in supporting the local flora and fauna. Two garden visits enabled participants to assess the elements of a habitat garden, 'ticking the boxes' of a comprehensive list provided by Elspeth.

The second workshop was led by Hepburn Shire Council Biodiversity Officer Brian Bainbridge. Subtitled "Lizard Lounges and Butterfly Bars", there was much to learn about the importance of starting with the small stuff, the micro-organisms, in order to provide for the birds and other animals. With his excellent photography to support, Brian explained the basic principles for establishing a wildlife garden, demonstrating from the development of his own Melbourne property over 10+ years, gradually attracting local birdlife, allowing different zones for the nectar and pollen eaters than the insect eaters. A recurring theme was the almost magical properties of the Sweet Bursaria shrub, and not to overlook the huge role played by leaf litter, fallen logs and branches and of course, mature trees!

The practical part of the workshop was carried out along the Bath Street edge of the Trent Creek Reserve, looking for small critters in situ or evidence of their presence. There were some great finds including a Black House Spider's



web near a suitable hollow in a tree, a very small frog amongst the leaf and branch litter, and significantly, an Emperor Gum Moth cocoon in a tree trunk. The photos of each 'item' have been turned into our own documentary of the day!

Overall, it's been a great season of workshops and we thank The School of Gardening for including HG4W in the program. More workshops and catch-ups will be organised.

Further to our noting of the generous donation from Josie Reid and The Trentham Trumpet, these funds will be spent on signage for the small garden at the TNC plus suitable labels for the various plants. In addition plants will be purchased to extend the habitat garden at TNC.

#### **Virtual Reality Training**

Trentham CFA members were given a glimpse into the future during a regular training session last month.

Members were introduced to the latest in virtual reality firefighting training systems, a hands-on program specifically designed for firefighters on the ground.

Pat Sutton, Trentham Brigade's chief training officer, told the Trumpet the innovative Flaim Trainer and Flaim Extinguisher provided volunteers with the real-life abilities to assess their skills without exposing them to danger.

Pat said the feedback from paticipating members was positive, with each given a specific task from a wideranging series of fire fighting scenarios.

These ranged from serious house and scrub fires to burning cars, farm vehicles and large and small planes. In some cases participants were required to conduct a search and rescue operation for any residents. "They were all real-life situations, and gave our members an opportunity to develop their skills in a safe environment without endangering them," he said.

"It has the potential to become a real gamechanger."

The Flaim system has been developed by a Geelong company in conjunction with Deakin University.

#### The Trentham Garden

#### **Designing for Winter**

Trentham... in winter. It's not necessarily the cheeriest place to be and it's when we feel our chilly sub-alpine elevation the most. And then there's the rain, fog, drizzle, and snow... it's not for the faint-hearted!

That's where good-quality knitwear and a warm, well-insulated house come in. But how do you make the most of your garden during winter?

Enter the world of evergreen plants both native and exotic, creatively clipped and shaped shrubs and beautiful hardscaping features like characterful retaining walls and paths. Think of plants with textured and colourful bark, and the curious-looking dried-out remains of ornamental grasses and perennials.



The robust leaves of evergreen plants allow for a rich variety of shapes and forms as the plants can afford to 'invest' in growing leaves that last right through winter. Viburnum davidii do brilliantly as a low-maintenance shrub in Trentham. Frost tolerant, clumping bamboos such as the large Bambusa textilis gracilis give a dramatic statement which could complement other characterful plants such as Melianthus major.

Evergreen natives such as tree ferns Dicksonia antarctica pack a strong impression throughout the year, and I often clip and topiarise natives such as Correa alba to add a cultivated, structured element to an otherwise informal garden scheme.

Think outside the box when it comes to creating a winter garden. Traditional favourites such as hedges work beautifully but what about using Japanese-type dwarf conifers together with the moss-like native Scleranthus biflorus and some ornamental grasses? Silver birches are great but what about trying a Chinese red birch Betula albosinensis var. spertentrionalis with coppery, peeling bark?

Rug up well when working outside, and when all else fails retreat back into the house, whip up a batch of mulled wine and call your friends over for a 'Christmas in July'. Trentham is no tropical paradise, but with a little creative thinking it can be a beautiful place to be in winter!

Weekday working groups have made significant progress on general maintenance and improvements in the Reserve, with wonderful members of our community working alongside the volunteer committee.

As we approach the first anniversary of last year's storm, it's good to see the area near the Lelant Street carpark has recovered and new plantings are flourishing. This was where one of the huge Brooker's Gums smashed everything in its path. The next garden section has now been cleared out, excess soil relocated to fill in hollows further down the path and rocks have been moved to where they're more use. The garden beds along the carpark include some of our local Geranium "Crane's Bill" which keeps coming up itself and is making great ground cover areas. There is a mix of small-to-medium shrubs with Poas, Dianellas and Lomandras doing the main work so far. There will be some lovely surprises in Spring when the Wahlenbergia, local Hardenbergia and various native daisies bloom.

The HSC Budget is also of great interest as our local Councillor Brian Hood has advocated for \$35,000 to install

shade sails in the playground. This is a project that the Committee has been working on for some time and we're very excited about the potential funding. We're hopeful that expressions of support from local parents and other users of the playground have encouraged the Council to approve the funds.

#### **Another Trentham Doctor**

Most Trentham residents are familiar with the great contributions Dr Gwen Wisewould made to the district, beginning in the late 1930s.

In fact, her dedication to providing medical assistance to all is celebrated in a wonderful memorial in our main street. Many would be aware that Dr Wisewould established her practice following a long line of male medical practitioners.

However, Gwen Wisewould wasn't the first female doctor to set up practice in Trentham.

A decade or so earlier, between 1922 and 1924, Dr Ruth Anderson settled into practice rooms on Victoria Street. She was the daughter of William Anderson and Mary Siddall, well known Trentham identities who ran the produce stores in Trentham and Blackwood.

Dr Anderson remains somewhat of a mystery, with little information about her time here.

However, my mother's family over the years has credited her with having saved the life of a newborn baby, and a very unwell Mick Dwyer of 'Glenwood', Newtons Lane. (Dr Gwen also features in several items of interest in the 2013 publication, 'Strength of Mind: 125 Years of Women in Medicine', which traces the early struggle of women wanting to enter the medical profession.)

Little is known of Ruth Anderson's academic beginnings; which university and college she attended.





But what we do know is that on 1 May 1926, she was appointed the Health Officer of the Western Australian Education Department.

Then on 14 November 1935, an item appeared in a West Australian newspaper, The Daily News, suggesting: 'that in all probability Dr Ruth Anderson, who is at present stationed in the country will be asked to come to Perth to relieve Dr E. Stang Senior Medical Officer of Schools, and Government Supervisor of Infant Health'.

Two years later Dr Anderson is recorded in a local newspaper as having visited her parents here in Trentham.

Dr Ruth Anderson lived a rich and varied life and died on 5 November 1970 from a cerebrovascular accident while living at 102 Ascot Street, Ballarat. She was 76.

Reading the 'Strength of Mind' publication, it gave me an interesting insight into the struggles and prejudices experienced by women wishing to enter medicine back at the turn of the last century.


Some of the accounts were humorous, some were astonishing, while others were almost unbelievable from today's viewpoint.

But at least one local family is thankful for her medical skills and perhaps there are those out there who can add to this brief story of a local woman who made an impact in a somewhat male environment

Here's to you Dr Ruth Anderson.

#### More electric vehicle charging stations for Hepburn

The Hepburn Shire will soon have three more electric vehicle (EV) charging stations thanks to a new collaboration between Hepburn Energy (formally Hepburn Wind), Hepburn Shire Council, and Chargefox.

Chargefox has secured \$89,500 through the Victorian Government's Destination Charging Across Victoria Program (DCAV) for three 50 kW DC fast-chargers. The three DCAV charging stations will be installed in Creswick, Hepburn Springs and Trentham by January 2023.

This collaboration will help the shire reduce transport emissions by supporting electric vehicle use.

The charging stations will be deployed on the Chargefox network, the largest EV charging network in Australia and will be installed by local service provider, Fells Electrical. Evan Beaver, Head of Charging at Chargefox stated "We are excited to expand our network in the Hepburn Shire, which is a beacon of sustainability initiatives."

Cr Tim Drylie, Mayor, stated "The DCAV program will ensure our community and visitors have access to fast charging infrastructure that will offer high connectivity across our major towns, whilst showcasing our shire's efforts to implement meaningful emissions reductions strategies.

The desire to reduce emissions and support tourism was something that came out very strongly in the feedback



from the community during the development of our Council Plan."

"Transitioning transport is critical to enable our shire to reach zero-net emissions by 2030. We have been delivering complimentary programs such as the EV Bulk Buy to support access to affordable EVs. It is paramount that our community is well supported with sufficient charging infrastructure to further expand on these activities."

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#### A Bathroom without a Bath is a Powder Room

Bathrooms can be tricky spaces to get right. In this article, I'm focusing on powder rooms used by guests and visitors. These small spaces are used infrequently throughout the day for brief periods; their design provides an opportunity for some fun or quirkiness.

In this room, consider taking a different approach to the décor of the other areas of your home, using a bold colour or pattern which might be uncomfortable or awkward in a larger space. A busy floor tile pattern in a large area might be unsettling visually, but in a small space it will appear more balanced.

Being a smaller space, you can be more creative, using finishes and details which are more adventurous, with a more dramatic impact. An unexpected chandelier or mirror finish over the vanity can provide a wow factor. Perhaps add an interesting, framed artwork or an oversized poster?

I like to use wallpapers in different ways, perhaps something unexpected; a vertical bold stripe will make the ceiling appear higher. Consider displaying on a plain painted wall segments of the same wallpaper using a selection of picture frames of different sizes and profiles.

For a recent project, on the window wall I installed timber panelling to hip height, with a floral wallpaper above, to the ceiling. The wallpaper pattern of flowers, leaves and tendrils made the room appear wider. We painted the wood panelling a complementary colour, reflecting one of the shades from the wallpaper.

Little details in bathrooms stand out. There is great scope for expressing your style by carefully choosing the bathroom accessories, always remembering that ease of cleaning is vital.

If space permits, perhaps select a feature piece of furniture which is not usually found in a bathroom, which also adds bonus storage.

Your guests and visitors will be surprised by your creativity!

#### **Food for Thought Group at Spudfest**

As did we at the Potato Scone Devonshire Tea stall. It was exhilarating to see a sea of people walking up Market Street with many to enjoy some 450 scones with jam and cream accompanied by cups of tea/coffee.

Baked by the group through rostered times and using the lemonade-cream recipe, we literally snatched the last batch off Rosie and Neil in keeping up supply, and by 1.30 we were 'sconed out'. Between the bakers, servers and the kitchen crew, we all agreed it was such a feel good time, another example of this small community at its best.

#### Quinces

I have a bowl of rustic yellow Quines on my dining room table that over the past few weeks have not only added to the autumnal feel of the house but also given out their subtle perfume. And now it is time to cook them.

They are such an under-estimated fruit and other than some sugar and water or black-currant and apple juice, need little more in turning them into a delicious dessert. I also add sliced quince to the apple sauce for a roast pork dish, remembering to pop in a small bay leaf with a couple of slices of lemon peel too. Then to make the quince jelly and paste from them.

But for this Sunday's lunch with friends I will serve Maggie Beer's Potted Quince recipe.....so easy with the flavour of the jelly close to Turkish Delight. Why don't you try?!

#### Recipe

5 whole quinces, with the fluff washed off 4-5 cups of water to just cover the quinces

4 cups of regular sugar

Juice of 2 lemons.

I add - 2 cinnamon sticks- 4 cloves - 3 pieces of both lemon and orange peel and a vanilla bean-or a few drops of vanilla essence.

Put all into a heavy-based lidded pot, boil reasonably high until a jelly starts to form, then turn the temperature to simmer for up to around 5 hours, or into the oven on around  $120^{\circ}$ C.

Turn the fruit a few times, trying to keep whole. Cool to serve with cream/ice-cream or if truly decadent a brandy custard.

Life is short so eat dessert first!

#### The Plonkers

Local Trentham identity, Brendan Lane, has been producing exceptional local wines for over a decade. Locally sourced high-quality grapes, exceptional technique and a passion for innovative wines has seen each vintage quickly snapped up by locals and restaurateurs alike.

So, in 2019 when he expanded his operations to establish the region's first ever urban winery expectations were high and certainly Brendan has not disappointed his army of followers.

With this in mind, the Plonkers and friends managed to rope in a designated driver for the day and decided to see how those early vintages were drinking now - Niles and Digby's verdict was an overwhelming fantastic!

Musk Lane Cellar Door is a rustic, but urban slick establishment found off a small High Street laneway. From the moment one walks through the entrance it's obvious that Brendan has utilised his wine making creative talents in the layout and design. Whether you come with your partner, group of friends or pet dog, it's clear that all are welcome in this non pretentious wine bar.

We began the afternoon's tasting with a bottle of Syrah Rose, not your typical light quaffer, this Rose was a deep almost orange coloured savoury drop with a strong orange citrus aftertaste - absolutely delicious!! Like all of Brendan's wine we tasted, the grapes for the Rose were handpicked and minimal sulphides were used in the production.

Now whilst Digby wanted to order another bottle of the Rose, Niles won out and we moved on to the Nebbiolo.

This fine drop spent 18 months developing in old French Hogsheads before being bottled in January 2022. The Nebbiolo was a fine example of Victoria's method of producing this old Italian grape style of red. Indeed, the Plonkers both remarked that this wine will only develop in flavour and structure over the next few years and would be well worth investing in a dozen to put down for a future occasion.

With a growing need to complement the wine with food, and a chilly wind blowing, we moved inside to the large communal table and ordered a cheese platter and a very tasty rabbit terrine before launching into the big stuff- a 2020 Cabernet that was as smooth as silk. Digby considered it to be the gold medal winner of the afternoon and ordered a second bottle without consultation.

Finally, to finish off the evening before our frustrated designated driver got too cranky, we ordered the 2019, handpicked, unfiltered, unlined Syrah. This full flavoured wine would satisfy even the most fastidious fan of cool climate Shiraz and left all content that we had sampled some of the best wines the area has to offer.

Musk Lane has proven to be much more that an urban winery, it is a venue in country Victoria that outshines even the trendiest of Melbourne's bar scenes and renews our faith that here in Trentham we really do have the best of all worlds.
