Trentham Community Hub

Works are progressing well, with the contractor on Trentham Community Hub project recently installing the majority of the remaining screw pile foundations to support the new sections of the facility. The hub is expected to be completed in the second half of 2023

Trentham Sportsground Reserve Pavilion

Works continue at Trentham Sportsground Reserve. With the plastering completed, internal and external painting has commenced. Internal doors have been hung and infill sections of wall lining have been installed in the original social space to suit the new configuration. The tender process for a contractor to complete the water main upgrade is underway. We will notify the community well in advance of when these works are scheduled. The pavilion is expected to be completed in February 2023.

Bullarto Station Building



Wet weather has impacted progress on the station building. The construction of the two chimneys continues. Following this, the rear wall framing can be

completed and the roof trusses installed. Completion is expected in the first half of 2023.

Trentham Town Survey

December Update

Council will be in Trentham to prepare a new Town Structure Plan in early 2023.

They are legally obligated to do their own survey (so don't be surprised when you see that) but have already expressed interest in analysing the rich responses that we've collected – no other town has proactively done this, it's being taken very seriously by Council – and highlights how determined Trentham's residents are to have a say in our town's future.

We will keep liaising with Council over the Town Structure process as it occurs.

Before we actually get our new Town Structure plan (it could take 18 months to complete this comprehensive plan) we have very little planning protection. The key action that residents can take (if they are unhappy with a proposed development) is to ensure they get 5 objections to the application for a planning permit. This ensures the application must go to council for consideration, rather than be authorised in the planning department, which has to operate under the current non-Trentham-specific environment.

If you don't feel an application 'fits' with Trentham's character, speak upremember you don't need to live next door or in the same street.

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St George's Marks 95 Years in its Brick Building

Launch of *These Walls Could Speak* by Peta Sherlock.

Sunday 20 November saw celebrations to mark 95 years in the current building, and the launch of *These Walls Could Speak* – a History of St George's Trentham 1864-2022 by Peta Sherlock.

The afternoon service, led by Fr Malcolm Thomas, included hymns sung at previous anniversaries, with a responsive version of Psalm 122 led by Val Goodwin, Charles Sherlock and Fay Magee, and special prayers read by Greg Magee.

St George's story was highlighted by Peta Sherlock introducing "seven voices" from parish records covering 1882 to 2022. Readers included Councillor Brian Hood and Kath Morrison; Geoff Proctor read from his mother Norma's Lively Ladies Guild Minutes; and Gwen Justice notes from her grandfather Ernest Wall.

Michael Worthington, President of the Trentham and District Historical Society, launched Peta's latest book. He commended her work, the result of many months reading Parish Registers, Minutes, letters and more. The title picks up the fact that St George's history is wrapped up in the people who have worshipped within its walls, especially



those commemorated in its furniture and plaques.

The service concluded, we all enjoyed bubbly and Lions Christmas cake, with lively conversations amongst those who came. Peta signed several dozen copies of her book: to get a copy, ring her on 0421 871 126.



The week before the Big Day saw a major clean-up in and around the church. Ian Hansford and John Anderson led the charge to remove a large holly and blackberry entwined within its structure, with Gwen Justice and Ian taking numerous loads to the tip. Inside the building, Sylvia Tett steam-cleaned the muddy sections of carpet where morning tea happens, while Bob White attended to ironing off wax from candles that have dripped over the years.

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Meditation

Meditation: a how to

I recently read a book from the Trentham Library: The no-nonsense meditation book. A scientist's guide to the power of meditation, by Stephen Laureys MD. I highly recommend it to anyone thinking about making meditation a part of their life. It certainly demystifies meditation.



Many people are discouraged from practising meditation because of preconceived ideas.


I hope to dispel some of these misconceptions. Some of these are also addressed simply and clearly by Laureys in his book.

- Meditation does not require any special equipment. Cushions, pillows or bolsters protect or support your back and create a comfortable seat. A blanket is also useful, especially in Trentham! It is essential to be warm when meditating.
- You do not need to adopt any particular posture.
 Many may be familiar with the traditional lotus
 position of sitting cross-legged with each foot
 resting on the opposite thigh. But sitting in this
 position is not necessary. Lying down, sitting cross legged on the floor, or sitting on a chair may suit
 you better. You can even sit at a desk. The most
 important thing is to be comfortable.

- There is no specific time of the day to practise.
 Meditation teachers suggest that morning is a
 good time as your mind is quiet, but the best time
 to meditate is when it suits you. Evenings may
 work better than the morning. The important thing
 is to be consistent.
- Your practice can be as long or short as you wish.
 This may be as little as a few minutes. Closing down the eyes and slowly breathing in and out a few times, in complete awareness, is meditation.
- Meditation can be practised anywhere, as long as it's safe! In the home, an office, a quiet room or a garden. Please don't meditate when driving!
- Meditation is for everyone, including children. You
 do not need to follow any particular belief system
 or religion or carry out specific rituals. I love lighting
 a candle or incense and playing calming music
 when meditating. Experiment and find what suits
 and is relaxing for you.

I hope these points encourage you to make meditation a part of your life. Doing this prioritises the brain and mind's health and improves your well-being. Wishing you peaceful meditations.

"As a Council we are focused on delivering important services for the community and infrastructure projects that serve the community's long-term needs," he said.


"We are also acutely aware of the importance of financial responsibility, particularly as we recover from the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic and recent major storm and flood events.

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Trentham Tales

Tis the season for picnics and fun.

From the early days of European settlement in the 1840s, Trentham Falls was a favourite spot for picnickers. With the arrival of the railway in the 1880s, it became so popular that on one Sunday it reputedly attracted 2000 visitors.



From about 1910, according to the Kyneton Observer, to at least 1954 as older locals recall, Boxing Day was the long-established day of sport at Trentham, held at "that farfamed and favourite resort, the Trentham Falls".

Central to the day's activities naturally were the sports competitions. The most serious contests being the wood chop and the clay bird shooting, with a bookmaker on site for bets on the wood chop. Almost as serious to the young men were the footraces, although apparently not in the league of the Stawell Gift!



There were children's events, running and novelty competitions such as the egg and spoon, three-legged, slow bike and sack races, as well as a race each for 'Married Women' and 'Old Buffers' - for men over 50. (For the record, this last was won in 1916 by J. Keogh!)

Rolling pins or gum boot throwing, tossing an 8lb wheatsheaf, catching a duck or a greasy pig also featured, as well as the very competitive ladies nail driving event. Recalling that it was usually won by the same woman, Grace Molony observed, "We were suspicious she used short nails!"

Sheep dog trials were also popular. Ted Toomey once bred "pretty good" sheep dogs. One Boxing Day, after his dog failed to round up the 3 sheep, Martin Dwyer observed, "Had a bit of trouble today, Ted? What you want next year is one sheep and three dogs!"



The greatest attraction of the 1916 Boxing Day Sports was deemed the "Irish Piper Band of twelve performers, which came by the morning train from Melbourne. They excelled themselves with beautiful inspiring music and generous, never-tiring playing."

Bruce McKenzie's memories suggested the joy of "inspiring" Scottish or Irish bands, with accompanying jigs and flings, was a constant at Sports Days, but often supplemented with less usual entertainment.

One year, there was an escapologist. 'Not 'Houdini', but 'Howdiddee'. 'Howdiddee' was bound in chains and suspended by his feet from a tree branch. "He struggled, shook himself briefly and the chains fell off. We all stared in amazement," reported one observer.

The program generally ended by 6 p.m., followed by a dance and supper at the Mechanics Hall. It is little wonder that Bill O'Connell, of East Trentham, once remarked that the Falls reserve and Boxing Day Sports, "were always thought of as a place of happiness, and a bit of fun".

Councillor's Report

Council – I am honoured to have been elected unopposed to the office of Mayor of Hepburn Shire for the coming twelve months. Council is facing a number of external and internal challenges that must be addressed for the sake of the organisation's long-term viability and for the benefit of the community and I am looking forward to tackling those challenges with my colleagues. My pledge to residents of Trentham and Coliban ward is that I will continue to actively represent your best interests at Council and will not lose sight of projects and services in our area.

Roads – in response to the recent severe weather events Council management has undertaken a Shire-wide assessment of damage to roads. The data will inform the extent and priority of remediation works. Of the Shire's 1400+km of roads 74% or 459 roads were assessed as damaged. Clearly the repair works will take considerable time and a sizeable investment. Road users are asked to exercise great care at all times.

Trentham Twilight event – what a fantastic success! It was so pleasing to see so many people out and about, shopping, supporting local businesses and enjoying the wonderful entertainment put on by our talented schoolkids (and adults). The event was a joint venture between Council's Storm Recovery Team and the Trentham & Districts Community Bank. A key feature was the launch of "The Big Storm June 2021" book. Please contact Council if you are interested in obtaining a copy. The book captures the event in the words and photographs of many locals, is a tribute to the emergency services organisations who support us so very well and is a wonderful record for posterity.

Commonwealth Games – in very exciting news the State Government has announced that Council's facility Creswick Trails will host the mountain biking events at the 2026 Commonwealth Games. Securing this event will be a significant boost to tourism, visitation, local businesses and really put the Trails on the map. Creswick Trails to host Commonwealth Games Hepburn Shire Council

Major projects/capital works – progress continues on the Trentham Sportsground Pavilion, Quarry St Reserve Pavilion, and the Trentham Community Centre. Coliban Water has advised that it must undertake works to upsize the water main that serves the sports ground and surrounding streets so that work will start soon. In response to budgetary pressures and challenges within the construction industry councillors recently decided to defer some other capital projects into 2023/24. That will allow Council to focus on completing projects already underway and will be more realistic in timing.

Walk Against Violence – thanks to all who participated in this initiative of Council. The walk is part of 16 days of activism against gender-based violence, a problem that disturbingly continues to fester in the Victorian community. It runs until 10 December which is International Human Rights Day.

Swimming Pool – the proposed opening hours for the summer season are 2-6pm on weekends; 3-7pm weekdays during school term; and 2-6pm weekdays during school holidays. Entry is again free. Unfortunately, a shortage

of staff is curtailing the span of open hours but they will be reviewed during summer. Last year's arrangement of opening the pool only on days where the temperature is forecast to exceed 21C will remain. Anyone interested in working as a lifesaver, or other jobs at the pool, should contact Council. Here's hoping summer actually arrives...

Grants program – Council is reviewing the efficiency and effectiveness of its grants program and is keen to hear from community groups. To complete a short survey please visit https://participate.hepburn.vic.gov.au/grants

Business Directory – a collaboration between Council's Storm Recovery Team and Trentham's Community Bank will create a new online business directory. The directory is open to businesses of all sizes, sole traders, etc. The Storm Recovery team engages in a number of activities designed to stimulate economic activity. Call in to the bank branch if you're interested in registering your business.

Planning applications – Councillors have made an important change to the objection process. Previously a resident wishing to address Council on their objection to an application would do so at a Council meeting... under Council's meeting rules of only three minutes to speak. The new process allows presentations from objectors to councillors at a Tuesday briefing session. While there are still time limits on speaking there is now the opportunity for interaction between councillors and objectors and between councillors and the applicant. This new process has already proven to be far more interactive and constructive. Other events - My activities as ward councillor and Mayor in the past month illustrate the diversity of Council's role in the community. I represented Council at the Remembrance Day ceremony in Trentham; attended the Sustainable Hepburn Expo; met with residents to discuss day-care services; participated in the Newbury Buddhist Monastery's robe offering ceremony and the 95th anniversary of St George's Anglican church in Trentham; had the honour of serving as one of the judges in the Lyonville Bake-Off; and in my first duties as Mayor participated in the new residents' function in Creswick and attended a concert in Daylesford.

Upcoming Council meeting dates – 20th December, 21st February, 21st March. Monthly meetings will be held at the new starting time of 5.30pm on the third Tuesday of the month. The public may attend in person or view proceedings via the live broadcast.

It's a Wrap!

I have been thinking about this year's Christmas celebrations, and I think it's time for the big wrap. We set aside an evening for wrapping, where over nibbles and a glass of wine we start to wrap and label gifts of various shapes and sizes.

It's much simpler to wrap a box than trying to deal with a rounded shape, so an assortment of various sized cardboard boxes will make wrapping easier. For fun, I like to use a box that makes it harder to guess its contents.

Remove any price tickets from the gifts, and neatly fold any flexible or fabric items. I also write a tag for each present, so I don't lose track of who is to receive what. I set out an assortment of tissue and wrapping papers, ribbons, twine and gift bags, ready for action.

I like everything to be coordinated. This year I've decided to go bold with warm and clashing colours: deep cerise pink, dirty tangerine orange, and glossy red detailing.

Here's my take on the essential steps when wrapping a present:

- 1. Your work surface needs to be flat, clean and large enough to rotate your largest present.
- You need sharp scissors. Sticky tape in a sturdy dispenser reduces frustration.
- 3. Correct measurement is vital: too much wrapping paper is your enemy! Roll out your wrapping paper, placing your box on one of its edges, and roughly measure enough paper to cover all four sides of the box, plus allow "half a surface" extra for overlap.



- Make your first straight cut from the roll or sheet of gift wrapping: you will now have a rectangle or square of paper.
- 5. Follow steps 3 and 4 for the other two surfaces of the box, trimming the paper down to size.
- 6. You are now ready for sticky tape. Centre your box on your paper, then fold one side of the paper up the side and onto the top surface, placing a small piece of sticky tape to attach the paper to the top surface.
- 7. Turn your present 180 degrees and firmly fold your loose paper over the side and over the top. I like to fold this edge in 1 to 1.5 cm, creating a neat straight edge. Attach this edge with another piece of sticky tape. Make sure that you keep your paper tight and firm for a tidy finish.



- 8. Now work on the paper either side of the partially wrapped box. Hold down one of your side papers, and at the other end fold in each corner to form a triangle. Your final fold is to bring the triangle back up to the side of the box, and stick it down.
- 9. Turn your parcel 180 degrees and repeat step 8 for the paper at other side of the box.
- 10. Long lengths of contrasting leftover paper can be used as a "belly band", instead of using a ribbon.

Trentham's rhododendrons and peonies have flowered magnificently again this Spring.

Peonies simply love our well-drained, rich soil and our cool climate. I recently unearthed Dennis Norgate's (a legendary former Trentham nurseryman) 1993 perennial plants catalogue which advised: "[A peony] needs morning sun or filtered sunlight. [At planting] needs 20 litres of old manure dug into the soil plus complete fertiliser and lime. Needs 10 litres of manure each May". Happy Autumn planting!

There is no denying it has been incredibly difficult for many, especially those affected by the massive flooding in Northern Victoria; those still battling through the after affects of COVID and those who have recently caught the virus; obviously it is not going to 'go away'.

Due to the increasing costs of living, putting food on the table has become more difficult for too many, to cause the need for food charities, and what invaluable organisations they have become. Working with the supermarket chains, the restaurant/hospitality industry and allied other industries, through brilliant logistics they are capable of feeding thousands of people each and every week.

Free access to Shire pools ties directly to the Council Plan, where Council aims to create a healthy, supported and empowered community. Council is investing \$500,000 in the costs of swimming pools in 2022/23, including staffing, maintenance, water and operational costs, along with \$578,000 in capital improvements following the adoption of the Aquatics Strategy earlier this year.
