The Generous Little Gallery

Covid didn't stop Little Gallery raise whopping charity funds.

A Trentham Little Gallery charity fund-raising exhibition powered its way to raise a total of \$13,000, despite the show being closed down by a snap lockdown within hours of its official opening.

The town's artist run gallery had planned a show, White Winter Rabbit Exhibition, showcasing works by the gallery team plus 14 invited artists, with an ambition to raise funds to support mental health via the local Path of the Horse's PTSD work.

Damage to the Quarry Street Reserve during the June "Trentham Tornado" resulted in the Gallery expanding the project to also donate funds raised to support restoration work there.

LG artist Rose Wilson said: "The storm caused so much damage, it was difficult to decide how we could help".

"But we figured the Reserve also supports good community mental health as it has been a place of beauty, contemplation, laughter, gatherings and a venue for community events such as Spudfest and Carols at Christmas".

The lockdown came out of the blue but LG decided "the show must go on," she said - so they went on-line with the exhibition and its associated raffle.

Once the funds raised were tallied at a whopping \$13,000, cheques for \$6500 each were donated to Path of the Horse and to the Quarry Street Reserve.

Dean Mighell and the Quarry Street Reserve management committee gratefully accepted the cheques, presented by artist Helen Cottle, and said funds would be used to assist in building a covered outdoor arena for wet weather conditions and for the planting of mature trees that was destroyed during the storm at places such as around the Quarry St playground.

Meanwhile, covid uncertainty means the Little Gallery has reluctantly postponed a planned pre Christmas exhibition of small affordable works by local artists but it hopes to run a similar show in the lead up to Christmas 2022.

However, Rose said LG is constantly replenishing the work it has on show, meaning plenty of options for those considering art as a Christmas gift idea, and she urged Trentham "to shop local" for Christmas as the town has so many wonderful shops.

There are many simple and creative ways to show your care and appreciation for loved ones without the waste that often comes with Christmas celebrations, particularly so-called 'stocking-fillers' which are generally items that end up almost immediately in land-fill - novelty gifts just aren't worth it. If you must buy stuff,

try to go for locally made, good quality, useful items that will last. But if you want to try a different approach here are a few suggestions from the Trentham Sustainability Group!

Vouchers All you need to do is draw up a little card detailing what you can offer as a gift to a friend or family member. How about 2 hrs of gardening, a series of 10 minute shoulder massages, a lawn mow, a haircut, walk the dog, babysitting, a tennis lesson - anything you can offer with a bit of your time and your unique skills.

Muesli You can buy individual ingredients in bulk from Hepburn Wholefoods Collective, or The Source in Ballarat and make your own signature mix. Load it into recycled jars and tie a ribbon around the lid (tip: labels come off easily using a bit of olive oil and bi-carb soda paste)

Flower bouquets You don't need classic flowers to make bouquets, get experimental by combining all sorts of foliage from your own garden.

Home-produce hampers Gather your home-grown veggies and herbs, you could add some seeds too. Combined with a 'voucher' of your gardening expertise, giving seedlings, and sharing your skills is a great way to encourage others to connect with the land.

Artwork Hand-drawn, painted, sculpted - you name it - it's like giving a piece of yourself!

Music playlist Use Spotify to make a custom play-list for someone special

Wrapping Use old magazines, old posters, your kids' paintings, or fabric off-cuts. Old National Geographics have some compelling images for wrapping smaller gifts and retro tea-towels make for wrapping that's a gift in itself!

Experiences Making a gift of something to do together builds relationships with loved ones and helps create memories that will last longer than this year's latest fad or fashion and it won't fill the storage cupboards either!

So, take the opportunity this Christmas to make presents and memories that won't cost the earth and ensure that it's a festive time for the environment as well!

Trentham Friends of Bees

Summer is (supposedly) on its way to our region, and that brings a new problem for humans and bees.

It was a lovely sunny morning last week when we spotted the first queen wasp hunting for a place to build a nest. Our local bees are still late swarming (we haven't had many consecutive warm days, which acts as the trigger for an entire colony of bees to seek a new home – see October and November Trumpets for more information on honey bee swarms). However, they will soon settle, and the urge to move on will reduce.

The European Wasp (also called a Yellow Jacket) is an introduced species. Unlike the gentle honey bee (also an introduced species) which pollinates flowers and generally leaves other critters alone, the European Wasp is aggressive and actively hunts other insects, or your BBQ sausage, to feed its larvae. They are a threat to native insects and your lamb chop.

Many people confuse bees and wasps. The wasp is bright yellow with black stripes and yellow legs. Bees have no interest in meat. That pest harassing you when dining outdoors is most definitely a wasp. They can be aggressive and, unlike the honey bee, will sting multiple times without dying. Disturbing a wasp nest is very, very dangerous. The best defence against a wasp nest is to stop one forming.

Only one wasp survives the winter season. The rest of the colony and its nest perished the previous Autumn.

A new fertile queen wasp has been hibernating and is now searching for the perfect location for a nest. She will be searching under the house, under the veranda and in the eaves. Often, she will mistakenly come inside the house, rarely will a honey bee come inside (unless you're a beekeeper and the bee is trying to get her honey back!). The wasp queen will find a quiet, dark spot to lay her first worker wasps and quickly, the nest will grow to 5000 wasps. At the height of summer, the nest could be 10,000 wasps strong. These wasps will be searching, killing and chopping up as many insects as they find to feed the growing colony. Beehives will be on constant alert. A wasp colony that discovers a weaker beehive will decimate the entire colony over several days, killing every last bee and gorging on the stored honey for strength and kicks.

So far this wet, cold spring, our local bee hives are struggling. A wasp attack on a hive is awful to witness, and once they start, near impossible to stop. Beekeepers set wasp traps and restrict the hive entrance to a few millimetres only, which allows single bees to get in and out and helps the guard bees trying to limit access. It's an experience to watch the mid-air 'dog fights' between bees and wasps once the bees have control of the hive entrance.

Right now, keep a vigilant eye out for the queen wasp.

She's much bigger than a worker wasp, and you may see her searching around and in the house. Unfortunately, you need to kill her. You can spray her. Once a wasp nest is established, it's quite a job to remove. Under no circumstances should you use insect spray on an active wasp nest. They will immediately turn aggressive and put you in danger. If you find a wasp nest in a month or two, specialist treatments are available, which should only be used at night or call a professional pest removal service.

In the meantime, if you see a big ball of bees hanging off a branch or a post or the letterbox, call the Woodend Bee-Friendly Society on 0417 313 002, and they will organise a rescue and rehome.

Councillor's Report

Mayor – Cr Timothy Drylie (Creswick) was elected Mayor (4-3) for the 21/22 year on 16 November. He takes over from Cr Lesley Hewitt who did a sterling job as Mayor over the past year in difficult and challenging circumstances. I nominated to continue in the deputy Mayor role in anticipation of again working closely with Cr Hewitt but withdrew my nomination when she was not successful in her nomination. Cr Bray (Daylesford/Hepburn) was subsequently elected Deputy Mayor unopposed.

Storm disaster recovery – 5 months into the vast amount of storm recovery work Council continues to work closely with a range of other State government agencies and contractors. The most recent forecasts indicate the recovery work will take 2 years to complete.

In the three months July to September Council has spent \$2.8 million on recovery works, an unbudgeted cost placing financial strain and workload pressure on the organisation. The financial cost is running at almost a million dollars a month. To put that into context, Council's shire-wide rates income is \$24 million a year (\$2m a month). Council doesn't yet know what percentage of these costs will be reimbursed by State and Federal government relief programs, however that uncertainty is not impeding works. Because we're concerned about the cost, pace, and extent of the works, we are meeting with State Government frequently to advocate for more funding and assistance.

The distribution of free firewood is underway and is likely to continue for some time as there are vast quantities available. Around 220 cubic metres is being distributed each week. Residents can also get firewood from local organisations that Council has supplied.

Council has prioritised work on roadsides and essential infrastructure to safeguard community safety. This has included works to ensure fire access tracks under Council's control are cleared and to ensure that existing and potential risks are addressed in a timely way. We are very mindful of the upcoming fire season. The removal of fire fuel loads is supported by DELWP and the CFA.

Council remains committed to ensuring support is provided to make our walking trails safe and is working with Parks Victoria regarding Trentham Falls. Although not eligible for storm recovery and must be funded by Council, these critical assets will not be neglected - their importance for locals and visitors is well-recognised.

Major projects – Council awarded a \$1.85m construction contract to a Ballarat firm for the Sportsground pavilion upgrade works at its October meeting and construction has begun. Works to upgrade the Quarry St Reserve Pavilion and toilets will be deferred into early 2022 as no bids were received in the first round of tenders. A more positive outcome is expected from the re-tendering process currently underway. Tender bids for the Community Centre are being evaluated and it is intended to award a construction contract at Council's December meeting with works to commence early next year.

Footpaths – the new High St footpath from Quarry St to Blue Mount and Mulcahys Roads has been completed and works are underway in Market St between Albert

and Victoria Streets. A new footpath will very soon be constructed from McCashney Way to Falls Rise.

Council – Council adopted its long-term strategic plan and 10-year financial projections (a very sobering set of numbers) in October. I have previously noted the significant challenge for councillors is reconciling the community's high expectations to financial projections that include underlying deficits; the highly restrictive impact of rate capping; heavy reliance on securing operating and capital grants from state and federal governments; a massive backlog of capital works projects and very low levels of unrestricted cash (which provides a buffer against unforeseen emergencies or discretionary spending). While the plan is ambitious and aspirational some difficult decisions are needed if Council's financial viability is to be stabilised and improved. In view of Council's financial position and recent deteriorating outlook councillors have resolved to conduct a comprehensive review of the FY22 budget within December. The objective is to address Council's liquidity and to ensure priorities and commitments are aligned to the new Council plan and represent an equitable allocation across the Shire.

Salvaging at transfer stations; planting on nature strips; collection of firewood – Councillors have recently reviewed the Local Laws governing these three areas after extensive consultation with the community, thereby overturning unpopular decisions made by the previous council. Revised guidelines will be released soon.

The Rex – councillors resolved 4-3 to not award a construction contract; to cease the project; sell the building; and directed officers to prepare a report addressing staff accommodation needs and options for the Daylesford library and cinema.

Community centre open day – the six community members on the Project Advisory Group (PAG), in conjunction with Council, are holding an open day on Sunday December 5 from 11am-4pm at the Mechanics Hall to reminisce and celebrate that hall's colourful history before works start early in 2022. Photographic memorabilia will be on display along with plans for the new building. Eminent citizens will speak on the hall's history and events ("Tea and Tales"), musical and other entertainment will be provided, various hall user groups will give demonstrations, and a sausage-sizzle lunch provided. The Trentham Lions Club and the Trentham & District Historical Society are supporting the event.

Covid-19 – after enduring lockdowns and restrictions we are finally getting back to something resembling "normal"... just in time for Christmas and summer! If Covid-19 has one valuable lesson it serves as a reminder of how important our friends and family are. I wish everyone a safe and enjoyable Christmas/summer period. Stay safe and healthy and enjoy your time with loved ones... and don't forget to support the wonderful local businesses who also did it tough but were here for us. And thanks for your support, encouragement, and feedback throughout the past year.

Trentham Quarry Street Reserve

Bushland Zone: It's nearly 12 months since planting in this zone commenced and the growth is very pleasing. The deciduous trees are regaining their greens and a variety of blooms, including some smaller ones in the bushland area, are popping up amidst the well-established grasses. Ongoing planting will focus on the waterways with a few hundred rushes and grasses ready to go in.

Bollards: The re-instatement of the bollards at the Lelant St carpark, paid for by the Committee, is another step in repairing the Reserve post-June-storm. The nearby grassed areas are slowly regenerating – the local birds haven't eaten all the seed! Speaking of birds, the sight of the Coot chicks and large broods of ducklings is bringing much interest and excitement as visitors and locals walk around the track. There's also a bit of steely guarding from parents going on!

Donations: We're delighted to have received two significant donations recently, one from Bendigo Bank, the other from The Little Gallery's White Rabbit fundraiser exhibition. Some of these funds will be used for maintenance as well as new seats. In particular, we will be organising for more mature-sized trees to be planted in the vicinity of the playground as part of providing future shade.

Volunteers: Our previous Working Bees have been poorly attended (thanks to those who did come along!), so we've decided to be flexible, working with volunteers at times which suit them / you! If you and a friend would like to be part of this, we'd be delighted to provide the necessary materials, plants, paperwork, etc. Some groups join in each week to work on a variety of tasks. Demonstrations regarding planting, mulching etc can be easily arranged.

Quick updates: The Pavilion/Toilets update project is still awaiting completion of the tender process. We were unsuccessful in our application for a government grant for Shade Sails for the playground. We'll re-apply in the next round.

Might be my imagination, but that trend seems to have been a little more muted this more sombre, frequently locked down year.



Hepburn Gardens for Wildlife

Program Launch

The launch of the program finally took place on Monday 8 November with a capacity crowd of 17 at the Trentham Neighbourhood Centre. The program has been developed by Jill Teschendorff – Jill's property "Green Lion" was recently featured on Gardening Australia - and Brian who is our Shire Biodiversity Officer. Garden

featured on Gardening Australia - and Brian Bainbridge who is our Shire Biodiversity Officer. Gardens for Wildlife Victoria is the over-arching body to which this group is connected.

The Trentham group is the first up and running with 5 trained mentors ready to assist locals develop their gardens to support wildlife habitat through using local native plants. A group of mentors is also already trained for the Creswick area.

The program is now auspiced by the Neighbourhood Centres in the Shire and registering for the program is already happening with several local Trentham residents signing up via TNC. Two mentors will soon begin the visits to these properties. Owners are invited firstly to have a basic idea in mind as to what they wish to achieve within what possibilities their property offers, eg land features, wetter areas, existing trees and shrubs which can be incorporated.

The principles of planting for native biodiversity are now well-developed and local plant suppliers are providing stock grown from locally-sourced seed which aims at the best match for plant and environment.

The program will also include workshops at local centres and opportunities for garden visits. For more information or to connect with the program, contact your local Neighbourhood Centre or check our Facebook page.

Trentham and Districts Historical Society Inc

Trentham Archives, 2021

Trenthamites know that the key to our district's character is its rich and diverse history - and it is this that the TDHS aims to preserve and make available to our community. The arrival of the building that will become **The Trentham Archives** is the latest stage in this commitment, one that began with the inception of our Society in 1987, and has been realised through the hard work and initiative of members and Committees since.

The Trentham Archives will meet the storage and research needs of the community, becoming the focus for the Society's acquisition, cataloguing, and preservation of material of local historical significance. In freeing up other buildings, it also presents opportunities for permanent and temporary exhibitions for our community to enjoy.

What is the Purpose and Need?

The existing facilities at the Old Police Station (OPS) site are no longer adequate to perform the core function of an historical society archiving. The TDHS now has responsibility for 4000+ items of historical significance. Our compactus, full of documents, photographs, family history material, artefacts and newspapers, is stored in the former garage of the police complex (right), along with equipment



and furniture. An overflow of collection items is stored in the police station itself, the tack room of the stables and a tin shed on site.

This arrangement has always proved challenging for our curatorial team. TDHS has long offered a family history research service. A recent photograph below demonstrates how such research is currently undertaken, often with the most delicate, historical material finding its way to the floor! Moving forward we are looking to expand digitisation of our collection to ensure safe and reliable cloud storage. The lessons of Marysville, which lost its entire historical collection during the Black Saturday fires of 2009, are never far from our mind.

It's worth noting that digitisation does not suddenly free our compactus of historical artefacts but rather ensures safe recording of their existence should the worst occur. We will be maintaining those physical items into the future, and where possible acquiring more.

Why this building?

Having reviewed archival facilities in similar historical societies it was clear that Trentham needed to take a leap forward in order to provide the community with the service it deserves. Our research indicated that we would

need a building of approximately 70 square meters to accommodate the curators, our historical collection plus equipment such as printer, computers, desks, compactus, map, picture cabinets etc. Other local facilities were considered, such as the proposed Community Centre, Library and old railway station but for reasons valid at the time, none were available or adequate for our needs.



Finally, cost was a major determiner - \$120,000 plus for a new facility versus \$65,000 for the recently installed reconditioned building.

What Process was followed?

Permission was given by DEWLP and the Traditional Owners, a planning permit issued and a building permit is currently being finalised. The process included community notification and updates via the Recorder and email.

What next (going forward)?

The TDHS Committee is very aware that the building and site requires significant work to ensure it blends in with the character of the OPS precinct. Once final installation has been completed, Susie Spence, our Vice President, will lead the program of concept design, site landscaping, painting/decorating and planting which will involve local garden designers/landscapers (still to be appointed), and the HSC Heritage Advisor.

This landscaping project has presented an opportunity to pursue a long term vision of the TDHS - establishing an historic timeline walk. If achievable, this will be pivotal in the physical demarcation of the site between the area of historic interest & the archiving function (The Trentham Archives).

The physical design of the timeline will clearly take time, and its content will be drawn from the research and writing of local historians, Peta and Charles Sherlock.

The Trentham Archives may never have been realised without the generous support of the Trentham Community Bank. We thank the Board, which clearly appreciates how central our history is to the people of Trentham and Districts and the importance of preserving it.

Christmas Greetings At Your Door

Christmas is not too far away. Street decorations festoon our shopping strip, shops and businesses, anticipating festive gatherings.

Unpacking Christmas decorations brings back memories. Two traditions that I remember from my childhood are my mother placing a ceramic nativity scene on the living room mantlepiece, and placing an Advent candle arrangement in the window.

I have pulled out our faithful old wreath to hang on our front door with thick red ribbon. The first wreaths can be dated back to pagan times: a never-ending circle, with no beginning and no end, representing the cycle of life.

The Greeks and Romans used wreaths to represent their power and victory. In Northern Europe, Advent wreaths were placed on tables with a candle in the centre, while a Christmas wreath was hung on the door.

In Europe, Christmas coincides with the winter solstice. In the 1800s, German tradition had trees brought inside as decoration, bringing life and greenery into the house from the cold. I have seen plastic trees in red, white, silver or gold, but I still prefer a living potted spruce in a basket, decorated with white candles and a few baubles.

Traditional Christmas colours are red, green silver and gold. Alternatively, mark Christmas with bare branches in a vase, whitewashed timber decorations, or presents wrapped in brown craft paper with raffia bows.

Outside, place on either side of your front door a potted

poinsettia, or a decorative candle in a lantern. Inside, hallways and entryways are ideal places for decorations: on a sideboard or table, place a bowl filled with glass baubles, a mini tree, or a pile of presents.

Need to drop a subtle hint to your loved ones in time for Xmas?! I LOVE a good gardening book... here are three of my favourites that I use on a regular basis.

'Paul Bangay's Guide to Plants' (Penguin Australia, RRP \$59.99) This is absolutely the best reference book for choosing traditional and modern exotic plants suitable for Australian conditions. In my experience, the information is always correct, and the plant selections are easy to find. Neatly sorted into convenient categories (hedges, trees etc), this is still one of my most used garden reference books.

'Grow Wild – Gardening to Sustain Wildlife in the Trentham Region' by Jill Teschendorff (Wombat Forestcare Inc. RRP \$15) If you are looking for information on indigenous plants local to the Hepburn region this is an invaluable resource. Available from the Trentham post office, it's got great lists of local trees, shrubs, and groundcovers as well as links to local organisations and native nurseries.

'RHS Pruning and Training' by Christopher Brickell & David Joyce (Dorling Kindersley RRP \$45) I find this great when experimenting with new shrubs and trees; over 800 plants are listed so it's great for figuring out what to do with that obscure plant you bought on Mt. Macedon! It's a fantastic book for both advanced as well as beginner gardeners.

Trentham Tales

The Ponsford Connection

Over the past few weeks locals may have noticed the recruiting drive by the Trentham Cricket Club. The club currently has three junior teams in the Gisborne District Cricket Association. The Trentham Saints have had varying success over the years but have always managed to field teams and remained competitive.

Along the way many famous cricket names would have been noted and remembered by players and spectators, but one name that stands out is that of the internationally revered William Harold Ponsford, MBE.

Bill Ponsford, in his later years became a resident of Woodend and a frequent visitor to Trentham.

Records would tumble when Ponsford, nicknamed Puddin', took the crease. He played 29 Tests with a batting average of 48.22 runs and 162 first-class matches at 65.18. Of his 235 first-class innings, 47 resulted in centuries, including 13 double centuries, and four triple centuries. Cricket historians say the heavily built Ponsford's agility made him one of the finest ever players of spin, but he struggled against hostile fast bowling, notably during the infamous Bodyline series of 1932-33.

In 1981, in acknowledgement of his fame and contribution to Australian cricketing success, the original Western Stand at the Melbourne Cricket Club was named the Ponsford Stand, and the name was retained when a new stand later replaced it.

A statue of his famous pose, completing a cover drive, was also erected outside the MCG commemorating Ponsford's standing as one of Australia's finest opening batsmen. After the death of his wife Vera, in 1968, Ponsford relocated to Woodend to live with his son Geoff, where he pursued his favourite leisure activities, lawn bowls and fishing.

A shy man, Ponsford was also into gardening and often seen by neighbours tending his garden and cutting the long green cyprus hedge that bordered his Woodened property. Legend has it that he was sometimes seen wearing one of his test blazers while gardening and when burning leaves, he would turn the embers over with a souvenired Test Match stump. Such was his detachment from his cricketing glory days.

Geoff Ponsford was a pharmacist, and it was through his line of work that an interesting connection to Trentham was established.

One of Geoff Ponsford's children, Michael, would accompany his father's so-called 'drug runs' to surrounding towns

Naturally, this included Trentham and a special point of visit was to the surgery of the highly respected Dr Gwen Wisewould. One could only imagine what a young Michael Ponsford would have made of Dr Gwen, her surgery, and her drug cupboard.



And one could also wonder whether Michael's peep into Dr Gwen's life influenced him in any way to take up a career in medicine.


Dr Michael Ponsford is now an Associate Professor and Rehabilitation Physician at Epworth Hospital. Needless to say, Dr Michael - who incidentally is not a cricketer - would have some wonderful memories and anecdotes of his iconic grandfather.

Ten years after arriving in Woodend, Bill Ponsford underwent an operation, but unfortunately an infection saw him admitted to a Kyneton nursing home where he remained for three years until his death in early April 1991 - aged 91.

At the time he was Australia's oldest living Test cricketer.

In discussions with fellow Cosmo Road residents over the last couple of months the subject of speeding vehicles invariably arises. There seems to be strong agreement that the current speed limit of 60kph - on both the Falls Road and Cosmo Road approaches to the township - are clearly inadequate for residential areas. There appears to be a significant number of vehicles travelling well above the current limit and, with little or no enforcement, the approaches to our busy township are less safe than they should be. The township has grown considerably over recent years and we believe that there is a case for a reduction in the speed limit.

It is felt that the appropriate speed limit would be 50kph, and we are hoping to work with our Councillor and MLA to achieve this. Councillor Brian Hood has been very supportive and has had discussions with the relevant authorities. Mary-Anne Thomas has also responded to our concerns and suggested that a petition from local residents on the matter would help her engage with the road authorities on everyone's behalf.

In light of these discussions, we are proposing to seek as much support as possible by way of a petition to Mary-Anne Thomas. The petition is intended to make it clear that there is support for lowering of the speed limit on the above - mentioned approaches to the township.

We will make the petition available for signature at various points around the town over the next fortnight, stay tuned to Trentham Connections.

We hope that you will be able to support this endeavour.
