

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

February 2011

10 years ago, the big news of the day was the Bendigo Bank was coming to town! They too, are preparing for the birthday celebrations later this year. The CBA left Trentham in 1991, leaving the town without a bank.

Thanks to the extraordinary efforts of a dedicated band of volunteers in January 2011 sufficient shares were applied for and paid for to secure our bank. The intent was to create 'much more than a bank' and indeed they have.

But we'll let the Bank tell the full story closer to the time!

We're grateful for the achievements of the team 10+ years ago, and very fortunate that we have CCCE so fervently supporting our local community.

June 2011

Trentham District Primary School takes possession of the new building.

'The students and teachers are very excited about moving into their new Art/Music and multipurpose facility which will be used for a variety of programs.'



August 2012 Community Bank notches up 12 months in business

September 2013

60 paintings entered into the tenth Hairy Arch Art Competition held at the Pig and Whistle Hotel.

Painting to the theme "Down to Earth", the inaugural winner of the Hairy Arch trophy was Pat Sutton, with Allan Dickerson receiving the People's Choice for his exceptional painting of a True Auzzie Bloke. All of the paintings were auctioned at the end of the day, and the proceeds this year given to the Trentham Primary School Kitchen Garden Program."

October 2013

Let there be light!

To the many tradies who have given their time to do another love job for the sportsground, to those who have loaned us equipment, to Trentham & Districts Community Bank®, Lorraine Donnan Trust, the East Trentham Fellowship, Trentham Football Netball Club who have all contributed cash to the project we thank you.

To Hepburn Shire for a cash contribution of \$79,000 and their project management and to the Country Football and Netball program for their contribution of \$60,000. This is a project in the region of \$190,000 that will provide benefits to the whole community and even to the whole Shire.'

Goodbye Trentham Hotel

Little is recorded about the early days of the Trentham Hotel which was originally known as the Bank Hotel having taken the name from its location beside the bank. It was originally built in the 1860s by Patrick Murphy. In 1926 part of the hotel was damaged by fire resulting in a brick rebuild and a new name - Hotel Trentham

Trentham Hotel's most recent publicans, Tom and Pauine Wells, put their own mark on Trentham Hotel. The Trewhella Lounge acknowledged the Trewhella family which has a long and proud history in the district being involved in timber milling and production of the Trewhella Jack. Tom and Pauline also dedicated the Gweneth Wisewould Room to Trentham's longest serving medical practitioner who moved to Trentham in 1938. We wish Tom and Pauline well in their upcoming adventures.'



The current pattern of 2020 appears likely to continue. A moderate La Nina prevails and 2021 should see average to above average rainfall. Temperatures fluctuating as usual with averages expected to be near normal.

Snowfall

Normally snow falls and lies on the ground about 4 days each year. Snow across the Trentham plateau is highly variable. In 2020 snow fell on 7 days, the heaviest snowfall on September 25 with local depths of 2 – 5 cm.

Summary by Month:

January: A warmer than average month – days warmer than average but nights cooler than normal. Well above normal rainfall.

February: Temperatures were near normal with rainfall slightly above average.

March: Another average month with no significant temperature extremes. Rainfall slightly below normal. April: A much wetter month than normal offering one of the best autumn breaks in recent times. The month was cooler than average with the first air frost recorded during midmonth. By the end of the month all creeks and watercourses were running.

May: A slightly cooler than average month with rainfall slightly below normal.

June: Daytime maxima were near average while overnight minimum temperatures were below average. A significant cold record was broken on the 9th with -7.3C reached with many pipes frozen for most of the day across the region. Monthly rainfall was slightly below average.

July: slightly warmer than average days but nights average. Rainfall was well below normal (79mm vs 130.3mm avg).

August: A rather gloomy month with frequent drizzly spells. Temperatures were close to normal with rainfall

slightly below the long term average and watercourses remained in good flow.

September: A changeable month including a snowfall on the 25th. Average maximum and minimum temperatures were near average. Rainfall was just short of average and there were several sharp frosts.

October: A wetter than average month with 20 days of recorded rain. Temperatures were near normal and there were 20 days of recordable rain. Heavy rains on the 8th produced 44.8mm. Pasture was in pristine condition with good ground moisture.

November: A warmer than average month with the average maximum temperature almost 2C above the long term average. An early burst of summer saw 31.3C on November 27. The average minimum was also above normal by nearly 2C. There were no frosts and pasture responded to warmer conditions with good growth. Streams and rivers had good flows in the first half of the month but declined by the last week.

December: A slightly cooler than normal month and drier than average. Prevailing southerly winds dominated bringing cloudy and chilly weather. Warm weather was rare although December 15 managed 29.1C.

Councillor's Corner

Australia Day - An event was held in Trentham town square with music and entertainment, flag raising ceremony, and a community BBQ.

Child Care – Council and the service provider ECKA are continuing efforts to recruit staff. Anyone interested should contact Council. Work to secure state and federal government grants is also ongoing as the federal government rejected an application for subsidised child-care late last year. There are significant challenges to be overcome and it is not yet possible to indicate when the child care facility will open.

Community Centre – The Project Advisory Group (PAG) comprising seven community members has resumed its work to finalise plans for the Community Centre. The architects are considering options. One of the next steps will be to provide feedback to the Community on information received through the survey that was undertaken late last year.

Consultation – Council is developing a new community engagement policy. To assist in that process two "pop-up" sessions will be held in Trentham on Sunday 31 January 2-5pm in the town square and Wednesday 3 February 4-6pm in the library. This is your opportunity to tell Council how you would like to be consulted and communicated with. All are encouraged to attend a session or contact me directly with your input. Through the first half of 2021 Council will be undertaking significant work on budgeting and long term strategic planning and it is critical that the community's input and views are heard.

CEO – Regrettably Council has lost its Chief Executive, Evan King, to the City of Ballarat where he has been appointed their CEO. The process is underway to recruit a new CEO. In the meantime Bradley Thomas has been appointed interim CEO.

Grants \$ - I am pleased to advise that Council's meeting on 22 December awarded community grants to The Trentham Trumpet \$2500, Trentham Easter Art & Craft Show \$2500, Bullarto Primary School \$2500, Trentham Lions Club \$2000 and Trentham Community Group \$2500. All grants were awarded for the full amount applied for. Watch out for the next round of grants in February...!

Grass/weeds – Council has recently undertaken grass cutting and roadside slashing in and around Trentham, partly in response to residents' needs and as part of its annual works plan. Notices to clear land have also been issued to landowners where grass on vacant private land has become a fire risk. Compliance will be monitored.

Quarry St Reserve – Several minor improvements have been recently carried out and the Management Committee are working on a master plan that sets out improvements to the pavilion and calls for additional tree planting. Council is replacing toilet facilities in seven locations across the shire, one of which is Quarry St Reserve.

Rotunda – Repair work and painting were recently carried out on the rotunda in the town square.

Schools – In December I presented Student Citizenship Awards at both Bullarto Primary and Trentham Primary Schools. Students persevered through a disrupted year, missed their friends, endured home schooling and learned remotely. Their resilience is a lesson for us all and it was delightful to see them end their school year on a high, surrounded by their classmates.

Swimming pool – Similar to other neighbouring councils there is a weather-driven policy that dictates the pool's opening hours. Details are on Council's website.

Tennis courts – Much-needed repair works will soon be carried out.

Sketchy Musings

I was walking through the summer sleet the other week, on my way to buy IGA kindling for our fire, when Trentham's cheery High Street Christmas decorations caught my eye.

Now, Christmas in Australia is very different to the Eurocum-American TV show Christmas traditions I grew up with in the 1960s.

But I did grow up with an immutable northern hemisphere rule that said the decorations come down on 5 January, the 12th day of Christmas. Just in time for the shops to stock hot cross buns and Easter Eggs.

My wife has an absolute rule: don't care how long it took you to do over-the-top "National Lampoon's Christmas Vacation" decorating, it all gets packed away into all those crates and trolleyed back into storage on 5 January. (As an aside, we went to Victoria Market on Boxing Day two or three years ago and a baker there was selling sixpacks of fruit cinnamon buns without crosses on them as "not cross buns").

Anyway, I stood in Trentham's High Street in late-ish January, adjusting my scarf and pulling the puffy jacket even tighter, while watching throngs of weekend tourists slowly circle the block in their cars looking for non-existent car parks, and suddenly had a silly thought.

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Social & Affordable Housing

Social housing is short and long-term rental housing that is owned and run by the government or not-for- profit agencies Affordable housing is housing, including social housing, that is appropriate for the housing needs of very low, low, and moderate-income households.

The availability of social and affordable housing for people in need is a chronic social, economic and ethical concern across Australian society. A group of residents has formed an action group, Safe Place Homes Inc, to address this issue in Hepburn Shire.

A 2020 report into "Social and Affordable Housing Needs in Hepburn Shire" commissioned by Safe Place has revealed:

- that the need for social and affordable housing within the Hepburn Shire is above the average for Victoria;
- that single people make up the largest group of people experiencing homelessness in the Region [48%] and there is a large shortage of one bedroom dwellings to accomodate them;
- the need for more social housing, particularly housing for older single women [55+], women with children, and for people with special needs;
- the need for more housing at an affordable rental, to retain young people in their communities, to provide for lower paid workers in the service and hospitality industries and to house those in the lower income levels;
- 484 households in our Shire are suffering from housing stress. That is, more than 30% of household income is spent on housing costs, especially rent

and mortgage costs, leaving inadequate funds for essential purchases of food, utilities, education etc.

The lack of this housing has negative consequences for the individuals in need, and for a more liveable and inclusive community.

Hepburn Shire Council does not currently have a policy or strategies related to social and affordable housing, but following intensive lobbying by Safe Place, at its December 2020 meeting, Hepburn Shire Council committed to having such a policy in place by May 2021.

This is highly significant as without such a policy our Council would not be eligible for ANY of the \$5.4 billion funding for the provision of social and affordable housing recently promised by the Victorian State Government.

Safe Place believes the aim of providing an increased stock of social and affordable housing within the Hepburn Shire can be best achieved by partnering with Hepburn Shire Council, in conjunction with local communities, landholders, registered housing agencies, homeowners, investors, builders, and State and Federal governments.

A generous and responsible community has a role to play in alleviating those difficulties. Safe Place Homes Inc considers Trentham to be such a community.

A Pentagon for Peace?

Peace with nature, peace between cultures and religions, and peace with neighbours and oneself. In the 25 years of its presence and work in Trentham, the centre 'Evera', has gradually developed 5 interrelated projects, that I like to explain in the form of a five-sided diagram: a pentagon.

The way the five points of the figure are connected by lines, invite an ongoing interrelationship: from regenerative gardening to tree-planting to seasonal festivals – to meditative interfaith walks and following conversations – to a sensory trail which leads to a second, deeper or higher level round from gardening onwards. Geometrically, the pentagon generates the spiral...

Right from its beginning Evera has been a destination for a variety of projects and activities: courses, seminars, camps, festivals. First on 2 acres, in 2001 was extended with the 13 acres of grazing land with generous shelterbelts of forest. Beautifully looked after by the Beatties and Justices families, it's a part of Trentham's economic and cultural history. How the area played a role in local Aboriginal history is still to be explored.

Evera has been a destination for visitors from a range of towns from Bendigo to Melbourne, Geelong to Lakes Entrance, and from overseas: New Zealand, Europe, India...Small numbers, but a steady flow: low emissions, the 'new cool!'

The meditative walks and subsequent conversations currently attract the most interest. People in this part of Victoria can be exposed to fewer cultural and religious differences, compared to more populous towns and cities. Some courses at the Trentham Neighbourhood Centre help to remedy this lack of exposure. So does the walking meditation project at Evera.



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Trentham Quarry Street Reserve Update

You may have noticed some changes happening at Trentham Quarry Street Reserve (TQSR) recently. After months of work, the committee is pleased to share details of some major projects that are currently underway, as well as the plans for developments in the near future for which we are keen to get community input. We will be holding discussion groups & meetings soon and more details on the projects are available on our Facebook page, or on request from the committee.

Management of the Reserve:

The TQSR Committee of Management works under guidelines from DELWP and in collaboration with the Hepburn Shire which assists with maintenance and development of the Reserve.

The Committee of Management oversees and maintains the health of trees & other vegetation in accordance with the stated purpose of the Reserve and the requirements of the stakeholders, in particular the community, DELWP & Hepburn Shire Council. Managing and planning for the Reserve is done by the Committee of Management for the benefit of all.



Organisation and planting or replacement of any vegetation is the responsibility of the Committee of Management. Suggestions regarding the Reserve can be made to the Committee but consultation must occur in order for the Committee to fulfil its charter of operation. (see TQSR Management Plan)

Reserve History:



Trentham Quarry Street Reserve was established in 1986 by the Trentham Lions Club. Under the guidance of President Neil Rothe, with a great community effort, the lake was created and current toilets & pavilion were constructed.

The Lions Club's involvement continued for many years. The Committee of Management is now made up of members from the general community. Recently the Committee has developed a Management Plan (*) and is now working on its implementation.

Over the years, assistance from HSC has increased considerably. The TQSR Committee is grateful for the regular maintenance activities, including grass-cutting and cleaning of facilities, carried out by HSC staff.

Quarry Street Reserve has become a major community asset:

- · Locals of all ages use it for relaxation and recreation
- Dozens of dogwalkers include it in their daily trek
- Many people use it for exercise, from jogging to Tai Chi, on a daily basis
- · Busloads of senior citizens from surrounding areas visit regularly
- Picnickers from the city and surrounding areas visit and revisit
- · Parents & young children play in the playground, upgraded a number of years ago by HSC.

In short, it is Trentham's most popular location.

With 2021 being the 35th anniversary of the establishment of the Reserve, it is a very appropriate time for a major upgrade of both the facilities and flora of this very special environment, for the benefit of residents & visitors to Trentham now and in the decades to come.

Major Projects:

The Committee is working on three major projects in relation to the current and future vegetation in the Reserve:

- implementing the TQSR Management Plan, including development of a long-term planting strategy to create a Reserve that is simpler to maintain for future generations
- planting of understorey & replacement trees throughout the Reserve, along with significant planting along waterways, to complement the Biodiversity Project currently underway in the Lelant/Victoria Streets 'Bushland Reserve' section
- extensive mulching of established trees & copses to support plant health and make park maintenance easier.

In collaboration with Hepburn Shire, there is also a project in development for the upgrade of the facilities (the pavilion and toilets) and the surrounding "built environment" (kerbing, access and parking). The Committee is looking forward to consulting with the community to ensure that these projects meet the needs of the wide range of people who enjoy the Reserve.

Quarry Street Reserve Zones & Planting Scheme



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Facilities & Built Environment Projects:

The two main projects that fall under this area are in the planning stage. The next steps include additional research as well as consultation with individuals and community groups.

Pavilion/Toilet Area

Council funding has been budgeted for a pavilion upgrade and the toilets are included in a Shirewide toilet-upgrade project. A collaborative approach between the QSR Committee & HSC is critical to the success of these two linked projects which have numerous elements, including:

The Pavilion

- Retain the current building footprint.
- Replace the angled boards to provide protection from prevailing winter winds.
- Bring the upper level of the pavilion down to match the lower level to improve access
- Update bbq facilities & add washing sink
- Upgrade Pavilion furniture with HSC current design.
- Install a drink fountain, including a dog bowl, in the immediate area.



The Toilets

- · Easy-to-access cubicles, including some suitable for disabled/parent room
- All internal walls to be as light & easy to clean as possible.
- Hot water, automatic soap dispensers and hand dryers.

Additional Elements

- · Research viability of solar panels to cover power usage
- Create an appropriately landscaped path connecting pavilion to Quarry Street car-park.
- Install new furniture across the park, starting in the pavilion.

Access & Public Parking:

Quarry Street, one of the busiest streets in Trentham, provides the main frontage to the Reserve. The whole of Quarry Street needs to be adequately kerbed and drained to ensure better flow of stormwater and less damage to the grassed edges & internal pathways of the Reserve. There is also a need for a clear path to the pavilion area from carpark, including vehicular access for maintenance of facilities, for major events and for some severely-disabled groups. The Committee is working with Z-Net/Hepburn Wind on a proposal for an Electric Vehicle Charging Station, which could be a valuable addition to the Reserve.

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Biodiversity Project - a Summary

Within the Reserve there are various largely open, public recreational spaces. The planting of indigenous & exotic trees and shrubs has evolved to provide worthwhile visual and practical appeal. It is also an obvious haven for local birdlife.

Native biodiversity is critical in encouraging and maintaining the indigenous flora & fauna of this district, contributing at numerous levels of society and culture. The Hepburn Shire is distinctive in that there is 46% remnant vegetation in the area.

The Biodiversity Project is being developed in association with Hepburn Shire Council's Strategy. This has been recognised by the Council with a Biodiversity Grant of \$4480 and represents a significant vision for three main parts of the Reserve: Zone 2 Bushland, the Stony Creek waterway leading to the lake and Zone 4 The Island.

The project involves four primary actions:

- ongoing removal of weeds blackberry, gorse, etc
- establishing clear borders to these areas for ease of mowing and maintenance
- planting and maintaining native plants indigenous to this part of Hepburn Shire
- developing and supporting community awareness & engagement

Major Focus of the Grant:

- tidying up and planting understory for the large-tree area at the corner of Lelant and Victoria Streets (as per Homewood Report)
- planting a variety of smaller trees, shrubs and groundcover on the Lelant St edge of Zone 2 which are part of a revegetation vision
- · support the longer-term health and survival of this area
- encourage wildlife through the biodiversity of plantings
- · contribute to community awareness and engagement
- · serve as a demonstration of ways to encourage biodiversity on a small scale.

At this stage, the Bushland Zone has become a focus for clearing, mulching and re-planting amongst some significant and mature trees, thus creating an understory. There is some remnant vegetation, including a small copse of Prickly Currant Bush on Lelant St. Work is also underway for the wetland areas.

Work on the island commenced in 2019 with a massive effort to clear a heavy blackberry & gorse infestation. Planting started soon after. Substantial growth of shrubs and grasses has occurred in a little over a year. Removal of blackberry and gorse will continue, hopefully on a small scale.

The waterways require long-term development, particularly clearing weeds, creating a good-flowing channel & planting hundreds of indigenous wetland plants. In time this will extend around the lake edge.



Extensive material and advice have been provided by Brian Bainbridge, Biodiversity Officer, Hepburn Shire Council. Lists of at-risk flora and fauna species are included in the Shire's Biodiversity Strategy, which can be found on their website.

The other main resource is "Grow Wild – Gardening to Sustain Wildlife in the Hepburn Shire" by Jill Teschendorff. This provides invaluable information from soil types, guidelines to preparation and planting, as well as a vast & comprehensive list and description of plants indigenous to the Shire.

Developing an awareness of native biodiversity is essential for the future of the Reserve. The Committee is keen to develop an educational element for local users and visitors, including display boards providing information about aspects of both the flora and fauna.

Top 5 plants of 2020

2020 was an extraordinary year for everybody, and we are all looking forward to a fresh start and hopefully better times next year!

For many people this year gardening became an outlet, passion and refuge like never before and gardeners might like to review their horticultural successes (and failures!) of 2020, and make plans for next year. Here are my 'Top 5 plants for 2020', all of which I have used extensively in my designs. They are perfectly suited to Trentham conditions. (clockwise from top left)

Geranium phaeum - This herbaceous, cold-hardy geranium has a remarkable, slightly spectral dark plum colour. I use it to add depth to a blue/purple or pink colour scheme. It gently self-seeds but does not seem to become a huge problem. Clean up the plant by removing the old foliage when you see new foliage coming through at the base. Plant in a position protected from the hottest afternoon sun.

Penstemon digitalis 'Husker's Red' - Usually in flower over the Christmas period, penstemon are surprisingly robust perennials that come in a huge variety of colours that could fit into any colour scheme. What I love about 'Husker's Red' is the purple/red colour of the new foliage; even when not in flower it makes a valuable addition to the border.

Kniphofia uvaria 'Echo Mango' - Exactly the colour of a ripe mango, this tough, semi-evergreen perennial matches beautifully with California poppies. I've used it successfully in gravel gardens where it's quirky charm can be fully appreciated. Plant in a sunny, well-drained position. It will flower from December right through to autumn if regularly dead-headed.

Physocarpus opulifolius 'Diablo'
- Grows to a convenient height of
2m and has white flowers in spring.
However, for me the real feature
is the dark-purple, almost black
colour of the leaves which makes a
beautiful contrast in the garden. Once
established, the bark flakes off in
layers, hence the common name of
'ninebark'.

Rosa 'New Dawn' - Used primarily as a climber, this rose has old-world charm with delicate soft-pink, scented flowers that keep blooming right throughout the warmer months. It gained historical significance in 1930 as the first plant to gain a patent in the US.

Take care of yourself, your plants and each other over summer.

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

Trentham Friends of Bees

Did you know?

- The reason bees are so noisy is that they beat their wings 11,400 times a minute!
- All of the bees that you see foraging on flowers are females
- Honeybees communicate through a series of dance moves called the 'waggle dance' and when they waggle for their sisters, it's on what's known as a 'dance floor'
- · Scientists have taught bees to do maths!

What's not to love about these amazing creatures?!

Possibly Trentham's newest community group, Trentham Friends of Bees (TFoB) is exactly that: aiming to provide safe homes, more pollination and reduce harmful chemical usage for bees. So far, we have rescued and rehomed a number of spring swarms and planted beefriendly flowers in private and commercial gardens.

Both introduced honeybees and Australian native bees need flowering plants to survive. They collect nectar from flowers to make honey and gather pollen to feed baby bees and pollinate plants – thank you bees!

So, how can we help bees?

- If you see a big bunch of bees hanging off a post, it's called a swarm. DO NOT POISON them - call 0417 313 002 for assistance and rehoming.
- Where possible include white, yellow, purple, and blue flowers in your planting. Bees have an excellent sense of smell and different vision to ours; they most easily see the yellow and blue ends of the spectrum.
- Try pouring boiling water on broad leaf weeds rather than Roundup.

Interior Design

I see red

So the Christmas season is over, the tree, its decorations and ornaments packed away. The wreaths from doorways taken down and the last of the wrapping paper and cards boxed up for next year.

Our table centre piece of candles, pine cones and berries looked so at home on our table, with table runners bordered with scarlet ribbon trim.

In Germany, traditionally trees were brought inside, decorated with nuts and berries contrasting with the white of snow outside. Our colour association with red and Christmas had begun.

For me, memories of the Swedish Jul Tompten (Christmas man) stories of my childhood are stirred up: the little man carrying a sack of Christmas presents wrapped with red ribbon and bows who could never be seen or heard visiting late at night. His little red hat and sack stood out against the cold white snow.

One year I was given a racing car at Christmas: a childsized sports car I could sit in and peddle around happily. Naturally it was red, the colour of speed and danger.

Red is both vigorous and assertive, no wonder it is universally used for stop signs! In nature red is the colour of poison berries, attracting and tempting to be eaten, but also a warning to stop or be careful.

Red is a colour that demands a passionate reaction. For the Chinese, it's a colour of luck, good fortune and happiness. Indians use red liberally in wedding ceremonies.

At this time of year, young couples in love exchange bouquets of red roses: the most luxurious bloom and the colour of seduction.

I was recently given a DVD series of Brideshead Revisited, which I remember watching on TV many years ago. Then it struck me: the set featured a connected series of rooms opening one upon the other, linked by flock and damask window and wall coverings, soft furnishings and upholstery brocades in the deepest and richest of reds.

Red was used to signify luxury and richness, wealth and power, a sumptuous background for galleries displaying artworks and collections.

Such grand spaces through history have been decorated with rich ruby, claret and vermillion. European decoration has utilised the power passion in grand homes and public state buildings for centuries.

But for you and me red is tricky in our homes. Very few of us live in grand homes which can cope with all four walls coloured red; at most perhaps a dining room, where red is intended to generate elevated spirits and excitement. A feature wall in red could be used as a background to highlight a beautiful tapestry or painting.

But I see red, everywhere!

Use it with restraint and it speaks so strongly. I believe in placing a little splash of red in all my rooms: perhaps some flowers, book bindings, artwork, lampshades or cushions. In my home, my favourite lamp has a blood red ceramic base and an ivory shade.

Many years ago, when decorating a children's clothing store, we selected white walls and light timber floors, black shelving, and then at the last minute we painted an exposed water pipe signal red: it was dramatic and obvious, but also retreated. It just felt right.

Red commands a presence, it focuses your eyes, enlivens your senses and enriches the soul. Be brave, be daring, use red.

Sport

Trentham Golf Club

After a hard year with lockdowns, course closures and clubhouse restrictions, Trentham Golf Club has emerged stronger than ever. There has been a large increase in the number of people playing golf around Australia, perhaps because many other community sports were suspended due to social distancing rules.

Memberships at Trentham have increased by over 60% since the start of 2020, to a record 380 members. The majority of those who joined during 2020 are from local areas. In addition, green fees and competition visitor numbers are up significantly, bringing more money into our local economy.

Charity Day

Every yar the club organises a charity day to support local organisations. Previously the club has supported the CFA and Trentham Primary School, and last year raised over \$3000 to help the Trentham Men's Shed with equipment.

This year our fundraising will support the Trentham and District Historical Society in the valuable work they do to research and record our local history.

Memberships

Trentham offers a number of flexible payment plans for golf other than the traditional full memberships. There are more basic pay-for-play memberships and green fee passes that provide more affordable golf than paying full green fees every time you play. Please see our website www.trenthamgolf.com.au for details.

Environment program

Trentham Golf Club is progressing well with the revegetation of the removed pine tree areas on the course. Several of the flat areas along Daylesford Rd are now completed with Maples, Oaks and Ornamental Pears establishing well.

A large area behind the 14th green has been replanted with 1600 native trees and shrubs for habitat which were supplied to the Club by Trentham Landcare. In all, over \$40,000 has been spent beautifying the course.

With a favourable Summer so far they are looking good. The project has been supported by the Federal Government with a grant from the Communities Environment Program. At the same time the Club is working with the North West Catchment Management Authority to control willows and invasive weeds along Stony Creek behind the 13th tee. This area will be planted out with native species in the coming Spring.

Tree management on the course continues. Some very old pinus radiata from the original farm land are reaching the end of their life and are splitting or in very poor condition. We also need to take player safety into consideration as trees age and drop branches. Keeping a balance between golf, the environment and player safety is a never-ending task that often soaks up money!



Did you know?

While the club welcomes visiting golfers and aims to be a valuable community asset, the club is privately owned as an Incorporated Association. It is not a municipal golf course. The title to the land is held by the club itself, and it is not crown land or owned by any State or local government body. We do not receive any assistance for day-to-day operations from any level of government. We employ two greenkeepers who live locally, contributing to the Trentham economy.

In regard to access, we have had instances of the public walking on the course during play, or allowing their dogs to leave droppings on the course and greens, both seemingly oblivious to the private nature of the club or of golf balls being hit on the same fairway. Please treat the club with respect for everyone's enjoyment and safety.

The fire danger period came into force on December 14 preventing residents from conducting burn-offs. It was also the signal for everyone to take the time to revisit their fire plan.

If you don't have one - then now is the time to start one. Importantly, please remember that an NSP - a Neighbourhood Safer Place - is really your place of last resort and should be used only as your last option. That said, the following points are the most important decisions you can make to help protect you and your family.

They are:

- which fire danger rating is your trigger to leave your property?
- will you leave early in the morning, or the night before?
- where will you go?
- what is your route, and do you have a back-up route if a fire is already in your area?
- what will you take with you?
- · what will you do with your pets or livestock?
- have you conferred with others about where you are going?
- are there others outside the neighbourhood who might need your assistance?

- how will you stay informed about warnings and advice?
- what will you do if there is a fire in the area and you're unable to leave?

It is vital that you keep a wary eye on the weather conditions and stay tuned to your local radio stations. And make sure you are prepared.

If you would like further information or advice, Trentham station is open every Sunday between 9.30 and 10.30. You'll be most welcome.



Letters to the Editor

I write in response to comments from "Name & Address supplied" [December 2020 Trumpet] related to land adjacent to the railway station in Victoria St, Trentham. This former railways site, was purchased by [not gifted to] Council in 2003 with a condition "that the land be used solely for community purposes".

At the suggestion of Hepburn Shire Council, Safe Place Homes Inc, a volunteer group of residents concerned about the lack of social and affordable housing in the Shire, prepared a conceptual proposal for this site. Council had advised Safe Place that they considered the provision of social and affordable housing would fall within the condition noted above, and it was on this understanding that the concept was prepared.

It is important to appreciate that this conceptual proposal was prepared for discussion purposes WITH the community, that no planning application has been made, or is under consideration, and that this site is not being "eyed off by a private concern".


The concept was prepared with input from Haven Home Safe, a not-for-profit Bendigo based organisation with more than 40 years experience in the provision of such housing.

Additionally the perceptions expressed as to profile of the possible residents of any social and affordable housing in Trentham appear to be preconceived and unfortunate. Valid criticism of this, or any other design concept is quite appropriate and highly desirable, but is more useful when based on fact rather than rumour.

It is hoped that this might translate into support by him/her for the aims of Safe Place Homes Inc, that is, the availability of affordable and safe housing for those in our community who are less fortunate than ourselves.

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The Plonkers

Our Trumpet has always been a strong supporter of local businesses, restaurants, and wineries.

Last year was particularly tough for our hospitality sector but with the Coronavirus under control and as tourists and locals alike abandon their couch and kitchen for some fine wining and dining with long-forgotten friends, 2021 should be a year of exciting opportunity.

To support our local hospitality industry, two of our local food and wine connoisseurs, Digby and Niles (the Plonkers) volunteered to do a regular wine review of their favourite food and wine venues in the Trentham district.

We hope you enjoy their reviews as much as they did 'researching' them...

• • • •

Our first wine review is from Trentham's very own, and much-loved Trentham General. It's now run by Mitch Reed-Rogers, formerly of Betel Boy and The Plough. The General's Thursday night Locals Night has gained a reputation for innovative dining and exceptional service. At a reasonable \$35 for a two-course and \$45 for a 3-course meal, it's no wonder they are quickly booked out each week.

But this review is about alcohol, not food, so- to the drinks menu!

The General's wine menu, whilst not extensive, has a diverse selection of local wines all at reasonable restaurant prices. Their beer menu would put some iconic German beer halls to shame, with exotic blends such as Kaiju Krush Tropical Ale and Dainton Jungle Juice IPA rubbing shoulders with the likes of Moon Dog Lager and Daylesford Golden Ale.

This visit, however, we steered clear of a cleansing ale and began the evening with a glass of St Anne's Sparkling Brut. It was quite a solid sparkling being dry, but not too dry - a refreshing aperitif.

A 2017 Granite Hills Chardonnay followed the bubbly. Not being fans of a big woody Chardy, we were delighted to find the Granite Hills light and fresh and a perfect accompaniment to the smoked trout mouse entrée.

Getting down to serious business, we ordered a bottle of the 2019 Dog Rock Tempranillo from the Grampians. It's hard to beat a Spanish Tempranillo as the grapes have been grown on the Iberian Peninsula since the Phoenicians settled Spain. In fact, whilst it's a bit of a rarity in Australia, it is in fact the fourth most widely grown wine grape in the world.

Despite being a long way from home, we found the Dog Rock Tempranillo absolutely rocked! A smooth, tasty, medium bodied wine with a very pleasant after taste. It's an easy drinking wine which has benefitted from 12 months maturation in 50% French oak. If Tempranillo is your drink of choice or you want a flavour upgrade from Pinot Noir or Merlot, then the Dog Rock at The General is worth a try.

Eating your Garden

Zucchini!

Summertime in the veggie garden. While we wait (and wait, and wait!) for our tomatoes to ripen, we're faced with other things going berserk. The late rain – and lots of it – has meant a bumper crop of berries which one can never have too much of, but is anyone else facing mountains of zucchini? Here are some ideas, please feel free to share yours too!

- Sharing excess produce with neighbours is always a good idea. Sure, you might need to leave the 400th zucchini on their doorstep and run away... but, sharing is caring, right?!
- Produce swap at the Trentham Farmer's Market (third Saturday of the month) run by TSG. Meet like-minded gardeners who are inventive and full of good ideas!
- Zucchini slice. My sister adds chorizo and goats cheese – and you should too
- Zucchini soup. Trentham has soup days in summer... add frozen peas before blitzing for a gorgeous bright green colour

- BBQ: Halve small zucchini or slice the large ones that got away and grill
- Roast: cut into chunky cubes, drizzle with olive oil and roast until caramelized but still a little firm. Top with crumbled feta and toasted pine nuts and your options explode- add to cous cous and call it salad, add to pasta and call it dinner
- Grate, squeeze and freeze (first in a muffin tin, then transfer into zip lock bags for handy sized portions.) Mid-winter, when excess zucchini is a distant memory, add a portion or two into any

stew / casserole / soup / pasta sauce which starts with sautéed garlic and onion.

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
