#### DEINKING FOUNTAIN

Great news! Trentham will have a new drinking fountain installed at Town Square in Trentham (works commenced 28 March). The fountain will be located next to the rotunda in place of the current Civic Guides sign and will be fully accessible (including a dog bowl).

The fountain will incorporate a design of timber and metal that complements Council's existing streetscape





## DE DR ROB GORDON RETURNS

Dr Rob Gordon will be meeting with us again in Lyonville on 28 April at 6pm, at the Lyonville Hall. We encourage you to attend and bring a neighbour or friend.

Dr Gordon held a Recovery Session with our community in Trentham last November and is coming back to assist us further with the journey of recovery. Drawing on his 40 years' experience as a trauma psychologist, Dr Gordon shares anecdotes and insights from past events and the families and individuals he has observed and with whom he has consulted.

#### ROAD REJUVENATION

Following the June 2021 storms, Council has now completed tree works, firewood distribution and tree stump removal. Thank you to all who have been involved in this large undertaking.

We distributed about 7,000 cubic metres of free firewood to community members and 40 local community groups.

We have decommissioned and rehabilitated the timber processing site in the east of the Shire, with local roads repaired around the site. We are now commencing work on the restoration of the other Council roads that were damaged due to the storm and clean-up activities.

For Councilrelated animal emergencies (eg. dog attacks and stock on Council roads) over Easter phone 0419 587 955 or for all other Council-related emergencies phone 0419 583 573. If your kerbside collection is usually on a Friday, your bins won't be collected on Good Friday (15 April) due to the public holiday. They will instead be collected the following day – Saturday 16 April.

#### Have Your Say!

#### So, Why Complete Our Survey?

Later this year, Council will prepare Trentham's Town Structure Plan. This plan will provide a framework for future subdivision, land use, zoning, open space, infrastructure - all to protect and enhance the unique qualities our community values.

It's important this plan reflects what our community wants Trentham to look like, so Council planning decisions reflect our wishes, and if challenged - VCAT will also.

Currently, we don't have such a plan, so VCAT can only rely on generic Melbourne-based principles which often don't make sense in Trentham! It's frustrating when residents provide considered and constructive feedback about planning applications which Council inturn support - only to be overturned by VCAT. And, to add salt to the wound, Council must pay costs (with our rates!) when VCAT overturns decisions.

There have been a couple of standout planning applications recently where the outcome may have been different if Trentham had a Town Structure Plan:

 An application right in the heart of town was deemed by residents as inappropriate and 'out of character' with the streetscape. Council unanimously supported the

- rejection of this application. VCAT overturned Council's decision as Trentham doesn't have streetscape regulations.
- An application to subdivide on the edge of town attracted articulate responses and offers of compromise from neighbours on nearby streets.
   Council again unanimously agreed that adjustments were required from an aesthetic and environmental perspective. VCAT overturned as there was nothing to base these requirements on.

Without a formal plan, VCAT can't uphold region-specific decisions. We don't want planning decisions based on other places; we want decisions that are meaningful to us here.

Council will complete their own consultation and due diligence when they start looking at our Town Structure Plan. We want to give them a heads-up so they'll better understand our town, its unique character, and produce the best Town Structure Plan for us.

#### Trentham Sustainability Group

#### TSG and CCCE join forces for climate action

Trentham Sustainability Group (TSG) and Cool Country Community Enterprises Ltd (CCCE) have come together with a shared vision for Trentham and districts that intends to strengthen and build community resilience in response to climate change. Both organisations recognise the challenges of climate change, and the impact it is having on our community and globally.



TRENTHAM SUSTAINABILITY GROUP

CCCE and TSG are key local organisations who can take leadership for climate action and are committed to developing projects that will contribute to the resilience of our community.

Our first joint project is "Energy & Climate Resilient Trentham". A feasibility study will examine secure and local renewable energy options for Trentham. The study will explore providing essential services sites with local back-up energy supply and exam the feasibility of a microgrid. The massive storm in June last year gave impetus to the need for action and helped secure funding.

The 'energy project' feasibility study is jointly funded by Trentham & Districts Community Bank and Hepburn Shire Council's Towards Zero program.

TSG and CCCE are excited to be working together - their shared values include a passion for climate action, reliable and renewable energy and supporting our community. They have signed a Memorandum of Understanding to guide how they can achieve these outcomes.

A steering group, including representatives from both local organisations and Council, will oversee the energy project.

#### Trentham Quarry Street Reserve

A big change at the Reserve occurred mid-March with the generous donation and installation of 5 mature Maple trees to provide almost instant shade from the north side of the playground. And of course, at present, they are transitioning to their autumn colours for added enjoyment. With the need for daily watering, we are delighted to have assistance from extra volunteers – thank you!

In addition, three smaller Canadian Maples have also been planted, north of the pavilion, roughly replacing the trees lost in the storm in this area. Many thanks to Stephen Adams for his delicate manoeuvres in digging the holes and then filling them again. Nearby are two Blackwood copses whose destiny will unfold more slowly!

There's always work to do at the Reserve, and often an hour here or there can make a difference. If you would like to be part of the ongoing improvements, please contact Fay (0417 113 927).

Finally, **please** don't rubbish the Reserve! Over the summer months with more folk around, it has become painfully obvious that many locals are using the Reserve rubbish bins to deal with excess domestic waste. In particular, some of the food waste has often caused quite an unpleasant odour in the vicinity of the pavilion. Fortunately, Council empties these bins more than once a week. However, it is not a good look – or smell – if visitors arriving to spend time in the Reserve are "welcomed" by full or foul bins!

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#### Cool Country Men's Shed

#### Men's Shed Finally Officially Opens!

Members of Trentham's Cool Country Men's Shed were pleased to be officially opening their wonderful new community

facility after two years of delay due to COVID restrictions.

"I would like to see this shed alive with men being together sharing skills, knowledge, life stories and companionship" said President Tony Johnston. "It's not just about wood or metal working skills, it's about men's health, which can be physical or mental. Some men have a sense of loneliness; it's the isolation that can occur after retirement or the loss of a life partner. Or they might have moved to Trentham and surrounding districts and lost their close social networks, there's also the fear of COVID. If we can improve men's health, the whole community benefits."

"We were fortunate to receive permission from the Dia Dia Wurrung Corporation and DELWP (Department of Environment, Land, Water, and Planning) to use this 1.2 hectares of land. Initially we were given \$6,000 from the Hairy Arch Art Show (part of our local art community), then we received \$60,000 from the State Government, our local Bendigo Bank invested \$42,500. \$20,000 came from the Federal Government, \$15,000 from the Trentham Lions Club, as well as \$15,000 from the Australian Lions Foundation. We've also received many donations from our generous community." Local Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas MP was a guest at the opening.











The idea for a Men's Shed in Trentham has been a long time in the making, with initial discussions in the community in 2006. But it wasn't until 2016 that a committee was formed and in 2018 project funding began to come through and works could begin.

The shed has many donated tools, including a sliding table saw, a router table, wood and metal lathes, some welding equipment, and a wood heater. It has a wellequipped lounge, a functional kitchen, and was built with fully accessible facilities. Tony tells me that if community groups have a project they want, they can submit a Project Request Form for consideration by the Men's Shed Committee.

Tony's original idea to make his dream of a men's shed a reality came from his hope to reduce the suicide risk in the community. "There have been several suicides in the last few years that have affected our community. I hope that bringing men together in this way can help in some way to prevent further tragedies."

With COVID restrictions and lockdowns over the last two years causing social isolation, especially among the elderly, the opening of Trentham's Cool Country Men's Shed will help local men come together and enjoy the facilities and companionship at the Shed.

#### Happy 1st Anniversary to the bigger Little Gallery!

Trentham's Little Gallery is celebrating its first anniversary as the bigger Little Gallery in its spacious, light-filled new premises by showcasing two new guest artists.

Covid restrictions have meant the Little Gallery has been unable to stage official openings over the last 10 months, but those shackles come off at 4pm on Saturday 2 April with a public opening of new works by local sculptor Peter Butterworth and painter Linda Wheeler.

The artist-run gallery has always operated with an ethos of supporting local art and artists and has exhibited works by more than 300 local artists over the last nine years. #### Gardens for Wildlife

Are you interested in learning about and helping to protect our local plants, birds and animals while creating a beautiful and personal garden?

This is the broad aim of our recently established Trentham Gardens for Wildlife group.

For no charge, trained mentors can visit your garden to encourage and assist as you explore the wonderful world of gardening with local native plants. There are some very simple principles which can help you create habitat for local wildlife you'd like to see in your garden.

Those of us who are mentors have undergone a thorough training program, covering a whole range of issues and learning so much about growing local flora and encouraging habitat gardening. Our group of 5 volunteer mentors has been working to create a 'sampler' of some of the smaller local native plants in the gardens outside the Trentham Neighbourhood Centre (right).

There are now two local specialist native plant suppliers in our area, sourcing seed locally meaning they are far more likely to grow successfully in our specific climate. Wombat Native Plants, at Bullarto, has a great variety of plants and well-documented website. Grow Locals at Woodend is a new version of the older Acres Wild business. In addition, Jill Teschendorff's book "Grow Wild – Gardening to sustain wildlife in the Hepburn Shire" is a great source of information not just about the plants and fauna but about our bio-region.



## Take a Bow (Wow!!!) Trentham and Surrounds A Big Thank You for your Support

The Dogs of Trentham petition circulating around Trentham recently was signed by over 450 people in just a couple of weeks. For a relatively small community, it was an amazing number to demonstrate overwhelming support for a dedicated off leash dog park in Trentham.

We all know how important it is for dogs to socialise, learn to get on with each other, teach each other good doggie manners, stretch their legs, and sniff lots of smells in a safe and enclosed space away from cars, kangaroos, horses, cats, birds, small children... and any other tempting diversions that often make walking dogs on a lead difficult.

We are becoming acutely aware of the importance of these areas for dog *owners*. Coming together with our dogs has meant support and connection during COVID lockdowns; healing during the recovery/aftermath of the storms; an opportunity for those new to town to meet people; and allowing those living out of town to meet and feel connected to Trentham and each other. It makes a positive difference to the mental health and wellbeing of both individuals and the community.

The Market Street Reserve has been a meeting place for dogs and their owners for the last three years. Last December, Hepburn Shire Council erected a sign stating dogs had to be on leash. As there is no other safely fenced space in Trentham to exercise dogs off leash, this galvanised dog owners into action. Many other Councils and Shires have allocated areas or dedicated times for off leash exercising. Hepburn Shire was asked to provide Trentham with similar facilities.

Your support via the petition was presented to Council in March. The councillors listened to our two requests:

- a short term solution of dedicated times for Market Street Reserve be an approved off leash dog park (with appropriate signage) and
- 2. a long term commitment for a permanent enclosed off leash dog park.

Council unanimously resolved: to accept and consider the petition; for the CEO to consider changes to signage at the Market Street Reserve enabling morning and afternoon sessions for off leash dog exercising; and to consider funding a longer-term solution in the 22/23 budget.



We would like to extend our thanks and acknowledge Cr Brian Hood. He has been very supportive of the need for this community driven project to be allocated funding and land. The Dogs of Trentham group will continue to advocate to ensure that your support for this venture does not drop off Council's radar.

The Dogs of Trentham group are going to have a stall at the Trentham Market on 16 April to raise funds to support dog and animal welfare in Trentham. There will be a photo booth where you can have a portrait photo of your beloved dog(s) taken and take some goodies home.

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#### **Trentham Tales**

#### It's all happened before -Trentham's brush with Pandemics and Epidemics

We've all been living with COVID for some time now - over two years in fact - but major health outbreaks are not new to our region.

History tells us of numerous pandemics and epidemics which have affected our community since white settlement, and even before.

According to Edward Stone Parker, the Assistant Protector of Aborigines in the Dja Dja Wurrung people's territory between 1841-1848, there were already mythical tales of smallpox epidemics.

The Dja Dja Wurrung people believed a mythical serpent called Minji or Mindie unleashed a dust, they called 'monola mindi', which caused dysentery, blindness, and even death. Fifty years later, school principals were required to notify education authorities of contagious diseases.

In 1890, the principal of Trentham State School, Mr Gilsenan duly reported an out-break of Russian flu in the district. Worse was to come the following year when local Mr Gilsenan's seven-year-old daughter, Caroline, died in late May 1891 and was buried in the Trentham cemetery during an outbreak of whooping cough and diphtheria.

It is not surprising that following the death of young Caroline, the extent of serious diseases and combined with the bitter winters, Mr Gilsenan made several requests to be relieved of his appointment to School 1588.

On June 30 1891, the Trentham Advertiser reported that the 'State school would reopen on Monday 13th July', which we assume followed a 'lock out' caused by the epidemic.

At the time Kyneton shire had published a health notice warning which alerted residents to cases of typhoid in the district and these must be reported.

Two years later a flu epidemic saw 60 cases in the local school, while between 1894 and 1905 there were outbreaks of typhoid and diphtheria. Recurrent outbreaks of typhoid were rightly or wrongly attributed to the water drawn from wells which was tainted by night soil.

But there is no evidence of a run-on or the hoarding of toilet paper – one can only assume the supply of the traditional newspaper squares was adequate!

1905 saw such a severe outbreak of measles that the school was reduced to 20 students.

The outbreak of 'Spanish Flu' which occurred in 1918 closed schools, and all public events were banned. It particularly affected men between 20-40 years of age and the high mortality rate shocked even the Trentham district where the deaths of several young men were attributed to the pandemic.

Because of its virulence, survival was rare. However, one lucky local, William Joseph O'Connell, father of local identity



Bill O'Connell, JP did survive, but at a cost. Bill lived with life-long respiratory problems, which, while not dampening his community spirit, did affect his ability to live the full and vigorous life demanded of a farmer.

Post war saw a rise in polio and diphtheria in the district. In 1947 several children around Trentham were affected; one local identity then aged eight spent several months in quarantine at Fairfield Infectious Diseases hospital. His older brother, still living and farming in the district, seemed to think the worst aspect of his brother's misfortune was being barred from competing in school sports – although attendance at school continued!

As a child Michael Brown lived on and off in the Fern Hill area and spent many happy times on his grandparents' farm 'Glenwood' in Newton's Lane. Perhaps a not-so-happy time was the 18 months he spent hospitalised as a polio patient. As a five-year-old, he started school at a special facility within the Austin Hospital in Heidelberg.

Frank Walsh's experiences as a small child suffering from infantile paralysis is well documented in his book, From Stilts to Silk. Frank spent his early years receiving treatment in Sydney, and during those three years only saw his parents for three weeks each year during their annual visits.

The polio epidemic between the 1930s and 1960s was the most significant epidemic episode in Australia prior to HIV/AIDS in 1982. Polio mostly affected children under 10, often caused paralysis and had a higher mortality toll than other 'childhood' diseases. However, Polio Australia estimates there are still about 400,000 survivors still living in Australia.

A contributing factor to overcoming highly contagious diseases was the development of vaccines. Programs were rolled out through the school systems which effectively 'captured' all children aged five and upwards. Currently cases of polio, whooping cough, measles, mumps, rubella, and meningococcal disease must be reported by school principals, or they face infringement and court penalties! This list differs from those of 50 to 100 years ago and this is generally attributed to universal vaccination operating through early childhood centres and schools.

We can rest assured the principal of Trentham Primary School is right up to speed with current requirements having assisted in the preparation of this article.

On reflection waves of pandemic, epidemic and outbreaks have all happened before and handled in much the same way – reporting, isolation, quarantine, mask wearing, and personal hygiene, and along the way unfortunately, misinformation, 'alternate facts', furphies, and doomsayers!

Will the next outbreak be any different?

#### Councillor's Report

I will use this month's report to focus on four major topics. They are in some ways inter-related but collectively they give an overall assessment of Hepburn Council's current state of play... Hopefully this makes the picture clearer.

**Finances** – the half-year financial report for the six months to 31 December 2021 is available on Council's website.

Notable facts include: expenditure of \$4.8m for the first six months on storm recovery work. Council received disaster relief funding of \$4.1m. Works will continue into 2022 and will expand to cover the January floods in Creswick. Council hopes to recover up to 90% of recovery expenditure.

Council's cash position has continued to decline. Councils account for cash in two ways. Restricted cash is grant money that must be spent on a defined purpose or funds that are set aside for a specific budgeted purpose. Unrestricted cash is available for discretionary spending and to provide a buffer against unforeseen circumstances. At December 2021 Council's unrestricted cash holdings had deteriorated further to be *negative* \$2.7m. Consequently councillors elected to defer or stop projects valued at \$2.5m, which follows a similar range of cuts last year worth \$2m, but had to set aside \$1m to fund necessary new spending. Hepburn Council faces ongoing cashflow challenges and will continue to rely heavily on securing grant funding if it is to be viable and provide services and projects needed by the community.

**Planning** – the Minister for Planning approved a new planning scheme for Hepburn Shire on the 10<sup>th</sup> February. While Hepburn's regulations had not been significantly updated for **20** years (Councils are obliged to review them every *four* years) the new plan is an important step forward...but there is much more work to be done in the coming years.

On that note I congratulate the Trumpet editors for supporting the initiative of concerned residents to gather input from community members on all matters planning. This feedback will form an important part of the consultation process and will help shape future directions in planning regulations. More detail on the revised scheme can be found at <a href="Hepburn Planning Scheme">Hepburn Planning Scheme</a> | Participate <a href="Hepburn">Hepburn</a>. The survey is on the Trumpet's website <a href="Hepburn">Hetrenthamtrumpet.com.au/survey</a> | I encourage you to participate in this important opportunity to put forward your views for our town's future.

Planning backlog – some of you are painfully aware that processing of planning applications is currently experiencing significant and unacceptable delays. Staff shortages, resignations and the high incoming volume of applications has created a huge backlog. Recruitment of more staff is underway, contractors have been engaged and some work outsourced to DELWP. As at Friday 25 March the backlog was 239 applications. That week, 8 applications were processed but 12 new applications received. You do the maths...

**Council's provision of aged care services** – a decision was taken at the March meeting that Council exit out of some aged care services, which will now be provided by

an external organisation. Sweeping changes to funding arrangements by the Federal Government are leaving councils Victoria-wide ill-equipped to provide services in this critically important area. Requirements to comply with national competition policy (NCP) mean that councils cannot continue to subsidise these services.

The "Rex" - Council resolved at its November 2021 meeting to discontinue the Hepburn Hub project at the Rex building. During 2021 councillors had decided to terminate the contract held by Hutchinson builders for a number of reasons; held workshops to explore all options for the project (including proceeding, ceasing, selling and leasing back); and received monthly reports. Following the termination of Hutchinson's contract the project was retendered. The decision in November was whether to award a new \$6.3m construction contract. However, the scope of that contract would not have completed the building. Further uncosted works would have been necessary. Effectively the choice in November was to proceed with a \$6.3m contract plus a blank cheque for the uncosted works or to stop. It must be noted that councillors are obliged under the Local Government Act to make responsible, evidenced-based decisions on behalf of the whole community.

The relevant facts behind this project were that public consultation in 2014 identified the location for the Hepburn Hub should be the Daylesford town hall. The Rex was considered but rejected at that time. However, the council of the day purchased the Rex in 2016. As at last November \$9m had been spent on the project by previous councillors and management.

The intended scope of the project was to accommodate less than 50% of Council staff (the others work from depots, libraries and field-based positions) plus the Daylesford library and a small cinema.

Councillors were faced with the November decision on the Rex in isolation. Despite being in existence since 1995 Hepburn Council has no strategy for managing the building assets (some heritage listed) valued at \$200m it is custodian for on behalf of the community. Despite being in existence since 1995 Hepburn Council has no workforce strategy to address how it deploys and manages its 210+ person workforce. It was only in December 2021 that Council adopted for the first time a strategy document that addresses workforce matters such as remuneration, recruitment, retention, etc. No consideration has yet been given as to how the workforce is deployed across the shire in order to optimise customer service (eg decentralisation of some functions).

So the Rex decision in November was being made in the absence of such strategic plans....which most organisations would be expected to develop.

The resolution therefore was to (a) stop the Rex project, (b) instruct management to develop a strategic plan for its workforce, (c) instruct management to develop a strategic plan for its building assets and (d) to assist the Daylesford cinema group to find a new home.

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#### Councillor's Report cont.

#### To end this report on a positive note – congratulations:

- I was delighted to see Joanne Pegg, principal of Bullarto Primary School, inducted into the Heather Mutimer Honour Roll at the International Women's Day function. The award fittingly recognises Joanne's remarkable contribution to inclusive learning and she is most deserving of this honour.
- Trentham resident Sandy Scheltema had her photojournalism work on storm recovery interviews with local residents accepted by the State Library of Victoria. This follows the National Library of Australia last year accepting her similar work on Covid lockdowns and experiences. Both sets of interviews will be permanently on display for posterity. Sandy has also recently been engaged by the SLV for ongoing work on the impact of Covid on regional communities. Her work was funded by Council, the Trentham & Districts community bank and Trentham Lions Club and generated a \$2000 donation to the CFA through the production of a calendar.

**Council meetings** – will be held at the new starting time of 5.30pm on the third Tuesday of the month. Currently the public may attend in person, but that may change depending on Covid restrictions. Upcoming Council meeting dates are 20 April, 17 May, 21 June

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#### Interior Design

#### **Big Things in Small Spaces**

My first apartment was small, with a tiny living room. A few decorating tricks made the space appear larger than it was.

I divided the living space by positioning the sofa through the middle of the room, creating two zones. A sofa and armchair made up a conversation space, leaving the rest of the room as a dining area accommodating a round table and chairs. I upholstered the armchair and sofa in contrasting fabrics, using lighter colours, adding neutral cushions for contrast.

The walls were painted brick, with glass sliding doors opening to a small balcony. I made some inexpensive curtains out of striped sheets; being unlined, they filtered light during the day. Vertical stripes gave height, whereas heavier drapes would have made the space feel closed-in.

Opposite the sofa I had a long, low bookcase holding a lamp, TV and sound system. I painted the bookcase the same colour as the walls and other pieces of furniture in complementary light tones, creating an airy atmosphere. A single large piece of artwork in a wooden frame was simpler than a gallery wall of mixed artworks and frames.

Invest in either built-in storage, or a versatile shelving system with a mix of exposed display shelves, cupboards and drawers. The small footprint of a tall shelving unit makes the best use of floorspace.

It's not always the case that lighter colours will help a room appear larger. I believe that a moody darker colour palette can also work well. When



aiming to create a sense of space in a poorly lit small room, try painting the walls a deeper colour, contrasting with a matt white ceiling, glossy white doors, architraves and skirting boards.

Playing with light sources and mirrors is a classic technique to create a magical ambience. Mirrors will bounce light; always check what images the mirrors are reflecting! Consider installing a dimmer for overhead lighting; this simple trick allows you to alter the atmosphere easily.

I enjoy the challenge of making the most of smaller spaces. You can try it too, but if you're unsure, this will be one of the topics covered in my design master classes later in the year.

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#### The Trentham Garden

#### **Special Gardens for Special People**

Nature is held up as the ideal model for gardens, but in some ways a garden is quite an artificial place with a wide range of specific, unnatural demands placed on them.

As a garden designer, I get two types of clients. Sometimes people are after a really top-level garden and want help to achieve this. But there are also clients who have quite specific, tricky requirements that make it difficult to create a successful design all by themselves.

Sometimes the priority is avoiding triggers for asthma, hayfever, eczema and allergies. Techniques include removing problematic grasses and lawns, plants with windpollinated flowers and even removing organic mulches which can release spores. Not all these factors will be relevant to all people.

Clients seem to really vary in the importance they place on privacy and hiding unattractive features in the garden; I dislike seeing bare timber-paling fences but some people don't mind this... everyone is different. Creating privacy often makes for happy neighbours and good design can often help achieve this.

The list of plants potentially poisonous to children and animals is enormous, but behavioural patterns need to be taken into consideration too; eg apple trees are technically poisonous to cats but are they going to ingest enough of it to be a problem?

Older clients will often look to create a more manageable garden... luckily, the trend over the last couple of decades

has been towards developing plants that stay small without additional maintenance. Raised garden beds provide access for people to continue enjoying their favourite hobby and people with vision issues will often prefer brightly coloured plants, plants with interesting scents and textures etc.

Don't be afraid to ask for advice at one of our fantastic local nurseries; with a little forethought and


planning you can create a beautiful garden that's suited perfectly to your individual needs.

#### **Plonkers**

The end of Regional Lockdown saw the reopening of one of Trentham's much-loved pubs – the Pig and Whistle. The new owners have done an expert job of renovating and restoring this family favourite.

Whilst the ambience of the rustic front bar has remained along with the courtyard windmill, a new pool room has been created and the interior has been completely overhauled into very warm, cosy and comfortable dining areas. The new look is further enhanced by external party lights and seating.

The Pig's menu consists of high-quality classic pub grub and a surprisingly good selection of vegetarian fare — even the Pigman's charcuterie board has a vegetarian option! The wine list is also surprising, with few local offerings but an extensive selection of affordable French and Australian regional wines.

The Plonkers' evening began with a bowl of spicy French fries, a couple of expertly poured cold Guinesses and a beautifully crisp and clean Riverland, Growers Gate, brut cuvee bubbly.

For their mains the Plonkers took advantage of the Tuesday Steak night special – a 250 gm porterhouse for \$24 whilst their partners ordered a home-made burger and the Goddess orecchiette vegetable pasta. The steaks were great quality and well charred over an open flame; the burger plump and juicy; and the pasta perfectly balanced, tasty and with vegetables cooked to perfection.

Our meals were accompanied firstly by an excellent Banks Rd, Pinot Grigio from the Mornington Peninsula. It had a beautifully perfumed nose and a soft mellow flavour with hints of lemon and pear.

For the red, usually Digby will demand a Heathcote Shiraz to accompany his steak, but tonight his more adventurous spirit took hold, and he ordered a Heathcote, 2019 Buckshot, Primitivo.

For those unfamiliar with the Primitivo, it contains Zinfandel grapes which are favoured in southern Italy. The Buckshot primitivo, typical of Heathcote reds, is quite a rich strong wine with a hint of cherry and a great silky, lingering finish. Interestingly, they found that the taste of the wine merged beautifully with the char of the steaks to produce a very pleasant taste on the mouth.

A perfect evening of good food, wine and company was enhanced further by attentive but not intrusive waiters and by the beautiful, thin stemmed quality wine glasses complete with etched pig and whistle emblems.

As we sat back and contemplated a cleansing ale in the front bar, the owners' dogs wandered inside to wearily settle down under a nearby dining table and we thought that there was not a better place one could find to have a pleasant time on a quiet Tuesday evening in Trentham.

#### Hepburn Z-NET

#### Hepburn Shire paves the way to zero-net energy

The Hepburn Shire community has reached 42% renewables, outperforming Victoria's state average of 29% and powering the Shire's transition to zero-net energy with local solar and wind.

This news comes from Hepburn Z-NET, a collaborative partnership helping the Shire move towards zero-net energy by 2025 and zero-net emissions by 2030. They recently completed an electricity audit of the whole Shire, finding that net emissions from electricity in FY2021 dropped 6,640 tonnes, to 35,640 tonnes of carbon over the year.

A large reason for this reduction was the increasing number of households taking up solar, with solar generating 17,840MWh over the year and Hepburn Wind generating 10,150MWh. Hepburn Z-NET partnership programs have been helping the Shire to tackle emissions in various sectors, ranging from transport, land-use change, stationary energy and waste.

Hepburn Shire Mayor Tim Drylie said that Hepburn Z-NET was a game-changer for community-led energy transitions and climate action.
